**IN MEMORIAM.**

(M. H. Tillitt.)

Departed this life, May 6th, at his home on Church street, this city, Dr. William Wilfred Griggs, aged sixty-six years and three months.

Dr. Griggs was born in Princess Anne county, Virginia, where he lived until the outbreak of the Civil War. As a physician he enlisted in the medical and surgical department of the Confederate forces, his long and honorable service being divided between the army and navy. After the close of the conflict he practiced his profession in Camden county, North Carolina, and the counties adjoining, finally settling here in eighteen hundred and eighty-two. And at the end of his life men saw him as dean of the medical fraternity of this, his adopted home, a physician second in eminence to none, and an exalted exemplar of all those higher and rarer qualities that the faithful practice of the noblest professions generate.

No man ever drew closer and held more tight the love and affection of his friends, than did Dr. Wilfred Griggs. And all true men who knew him were proud to call themselves his friends. As a physician, he practiced ably and well, and of a profession the most charitable on earth, the left hand, in very truth, not knowing what the right hand does, he stood among its foremost members: in his daily private and business life, spotless, fearlessly upright, he was a guide to the young, a philosopher to the old and a friend to all: as alderman, in town council, he stood for the rights of the people and the honor of the municipality, and after the termination of his office, in town meeting and public gathering, he kept sleepless watch over his duties of citizenship against threatened attacks of possible corruption, no matter in what plausible guise they came, his words being listened to by all for they were above suspicion: in his religion, he was a very perfect Christian gentleman, without the littleness of sect; and as a personal friend, he was true and tried, ready to fight a friend's battles for him, if he were absent, ready to stand shoulder to shoulder with him, if he were present and an unjust word or act said or done against a friend, he held as said or done against himself.

"He was a man, take him for all in all," and in his philosophy of life, forgetfulness of others in self-love, slander and all those little meannesses that daily walk the streets found no part nor welcome.

His end was as it should have been. The race well run, the victory gained, and then a gently lying down to sleep and rest, for there was no struggle at the last, merely a long-drawn sigh as the spirit passed.

Soldier, physician, Christian, man and friend, he has gone to his Home among the many mansions.

**HUSBAND SUSPECTED OF STRANGLING WIFE.**

Dead Woman Had His Photograph on Her Breast—Picture Show Suspended.

Raleigh, N. C., May 6.—Laid out for burial with a photograph of her husband on her breast, the body of Lizzie Guthrie was found in her bed at Durham this morning.

**KUROKI COMES TO FAIR THIS WEEK.**

Big Review at Exposition in Honor of Conqueror of Yalu Fight.

Norfolk, Va., May 6.—When General Kuroki and his staff of naval and military aids come to visit the Jamestown Exposition this week they will doubtless be impressed. Since no Japanese ever allows any one to know what his impressions really are, the exposition officials and the officers over at Fortress Monroe will have to accept the delicately turned compliments that will be inevitable as genuine.

By virtue of his rank and occupation, General Kuroki will be to a great extent monopolized by the army during his stay here. The Chamberlain, at Old Point Comfort, will probably be made his official lodging place, and the officers' quarters in the fort will see much of him.

**TAFT IS HIGHLY GRATIFIED, HE SAYS.**

Genial War Secretary Predicts That Show Will be Great Success.

Norfolk, Va., May 6.—Secretary of War Taft was the guest of honor at the Jamestown Exposition this afternoon. Coming over from Old Point Comfort, accompanied by Mr. Barton Myers, one of the governors of the exposition, he was received by the exposition officials in the auditorium. After this he witnessed the dress parade of the Twenty-third infantry on Lee Parade. It was the first parade by the Twenty-third on the beautiful grounds, and it will be a part of the daily life of the exposition in future.

The War Secretary also inspected the government and other buildings, at the exposition, but his visit was in no way official. He has been a friend of the exposition from the beginning. He expressed himself as being highly gratified at the appearance of things on the grounds and predicted that the exposition will be a great success.
