Every excess has its corresponding depression. Every wild statement diminishes confidence. The cry of wolf, wolf, when there is no wolf, is sure to wear out the patience of any sane people. Every newspaper story should be judicially written and the headline should convey no false impression of what is in the story. A few years ago the muckraker had it all his own way in the city world. Now he is often kept busy trying to hold his job. In the effort to do so he is explaining with his old time vigor, how, much of what he formerly said, he didn't mean. Public approval and confidence revert, as it has always done, to the unostentatious and honest worker. We gladly give place to the above editorial from the Charlotte Observer because it tersely says what we are convinced is a fact. In the lesson it would teach journalism are some very practical which are applicable to the individual fault finder, scandal-monger and mischief-maker as well as to the muck-raking. There is no need to state these, since one can see them between the lines of the editorial quoted; but we are led to emphasize
