JUROR SHOT HIMSELF

Lexington, Aug. 25.—John Young a juror in the civil court here, attempted suicide early this morning by shooting himself with a shot gun. The doctors say that it is almost impossible for him to live the wound being of a very serious nature. He was serving as a juror in the long drawn out Lane case against the Southern Railway which has been on trial since Monday and all evidence had been produced when this morning before the convening of court he tried to kill himself. It is thought that his mind was unbalanced, as he acted very peculiar some years ago while serving as a juror. He fled to the woods and remained there for an indefinite time and did not visit Lexington for a long period of time. So this rather perplexing case seemed to have a tendency of unbalancing his mind. He was about fifty years of age and lived out in Silver Hill township this county. He committed the deed out at his own home where he had gone to spend the night. The case has been continued with only eleven jurors.

WHOLE TRAIN LEFT TRACK

Asheville, Aug. 26.—Train No. 22 which left Asheville this morning at 8 o'clock for Goldsboro, was wrecked at 10:45 a. m., two miles west of Connelly Springs. None of the passengers was injured to any extent. Only slight bruises were sustained. The whole train left the track near a 150 foot gorge, ran its length and stopped, on the brink of the gorge almost and about 20 feet from the track. The fireman John Lenoir, had his left jaw scalped his left wrist and left hip bruised and two slight scalds. The engineer was shaken up. The wrecking crew at Bridgewater was sent to the scene of the wreck, while a relief train was sent from Asheville to transfer with westbound passenger train No. 11. About 50 yards of track was torn up. The cause of the wreck is unknown.
