Excitement at Pembroke.

Considerable excitement was caused here Saturday night on account of a telegram received by Sheriff McLeod bearing the postmark of Pembroke, signed by a friend and stating that a riot was threatening in that town. Sheriff McLeod secured a posse and boarded the afternoon train for the scene of the disturbance. Soon after reaching there, the crowd dispersed. One man was shot in the arm, but not dangerously. How or by whom has not been learned. The cause of the disturbance was primarily liquor which a number of the Croatan about the village had been indulging in too freely and in consequence of which they were making themselves exceedingly conspicuous about the place, firing their guns and pistols and acting in such a way as to arouse the fears of the people lest some difficulty might arise, the consequence of which would be serious. However all passed off quietly so soon as the presence of the law in presence of its recognized executors was recognized.

Runaway.

Some little excitement was caused here Monday morning by the running away of a mule belonging to Mr. S. Weinstein. One of his children was in the buggy, and another standing between the wheels, when the mule became frightened, and ran, throwing the child to the ground, and one wheel ran over her. After going a short distance the child in the buggy jumped to the ground. Although both were bruised severely they sustained no serious injuries. A second time Monday morning the mule ran away. This time Mr. Ike Snyder was alone in the buggy. The mule took in the sides of houses, telephone poles, barber posts, and things in general. Three of the wheels were released entirely of their spokes. Mr. Snyder escaped without injury. The mule evidently found out it was Christmas, and wanted his holiday.

Mr. Traywick Dead.

Mr. Stephen McIntyre received a message by telephone yesterday morning announcing the death of Rev. S. R. Traywick, which occurred Wednesday night about nine o'clock, at his home in Laurinburg. He has been quite sick for several months past and his death was not unexpected. Mr. Traywick is known to many of our people, having visited at the homes of Dr. R. T. Allen and Mrs. S. McIntyre. He had been a member of the North Carolina Conference for many years past. The burial was made yesterday afternoon. On account of no train going there by here before evening, his relatives here were unable to be present.

We regret to chronicle the death of Mr. Daniel J. Hedgpeth which occurred at his home near Oakton Church, Sunday. Mr. Hedgpeth was apparently in good health, having not long since recovered from a severe attack of sickness. Sunday he was taken with hemorrhage of the lungs, which resulted in his death.
