Notice to Water Users

To the Public:

The board of commissioners of the town
of Lumberton has under consideration
plans for the extension of the system of
water works and sewerage now owned by
the town, and to that end have employed
an engineer to make plans and specifica-
tions for the extension of the system in
the entire town. Of course, it will
be impossible to lay the water and sewerage
pipes upon every street as this would
involve the expenditure of a sum far
greater than is available at this time for
this purpose. It therefore becomes nec-
essary for the board to be advised as to
names of all persons who desire connec-
tions with the water and sewerage mains
made with their residences so that the
board can then determine upon what
streets to run these lines, the lines run in
accordance with the wishes of the major-
ity of the patrons. It is the purpose of
the board to call an election hereafter up-
on the question of issuing bonds for this
purpose. In the meantime I beg to re-
quest that all persons desiring the water
and sewerage mains to connect with their
residences to give me their names imme-
diately.
