NEXT TUESDAY'S ELECTION.

What Offices Are to be Filled in Several States and Territor ies.

New York Dispately

A week from Tuesday there will be election in forty two States and three Territories. Oregon, Maine and Vermont have already elected State officers and members of the Sixtieth Congress. In twenty-three of the States a Governor and other State officers (in twenty of them also, a Legislature); in ten, minor State officers of justices of the Supreme Court; in two, congress men and a Legislature, and in seven congressmen only, are to be elected. Oklahoma is to vote on a State Constitution, and Ari zona and New Mexico on joint statehood
