

SOIL SURVEY OF ROBESON.

A Map to be Made Giving all Information in Regard to County.

The Government and State are cooperating in making a soil map of Robeson county and Messrs. W. E. Hearu, of the Bureau of soils, of Washington, and G. M. MacMider, of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, of Raleigh, are now engaged in this work around Red Springs. These gentlemen will be working in the vicinity of Lumberton early next spring. The map will show all the public roads, railroads, streams, ponds, private roads, churches, school houses, towns, and postoffices, giving an accurate map of the entire county an a scale one mile one inch. Opon this map will be shown in different colors the different grades or soil types in the county. Boreings to a depth of 3 feet are taken at very frequent intervals which will determine the character of both the soil and subsoil. The soil is classified in the field according to the texture or mechanical composition, color, topography, drainage, and crop adaptation. Several samples are collected from each of the different soil types, one set sent to Washingcon, D. C., where mechanical analyses are made, and a duplicate set including samples of all phases are forwarded to Raleigh where chemical analyses are made accompanying the map will be a detail description of each soil type, the crops grown, and its adaptation to new or varied crops. Another chapter will give the location and boundaries of the county, early settlement, agricultural development, transporation facilities, markets, and climatic conditions. The last chapter will be a general summary of the agricultural conditions at the present time, relating to all the crops grown, labor conditions, size of farms, tenure of faamers, methods of cultivation and sug for improve ments, prices of land.
