CONGRESS WORKING AGAIN.

The Fifty-Ninth Congress began its first session at noon Monday. It took both the Senate and House of Representatives but one hour and fifteen minutes to arrange all preliminary matters. The Senate received along list of appointments for confirmation from President Roosevelt. Senators Penrose and Foraker came forward with resolution of inquiry regarding the discharge of the negro troops. One was addressed to the President, the other to the Secretary of War, Vice President Fairbanks said that it was unusual to transact any business until the President's message had been received, which was put in form of a motion and carried.

The opening of both houses were crowded. Many ladies were present, among them being Mrs. Nicholas Longworth, the President's daughter. There will also be a great change in the cabinet this year. The following will appear in the new cabinet: Secretary of State, Elihu Root; Secretary of Treasury, George B. Cortelyou; Secretary of the Navy, Victor H. Metcalf; Secretary of the Interior, James R. Garfield; Attorney General, Chas. J. Bonaparte; Post Master General, George Von Meyer; Secretary of Commerce and Labor, Oscar L. Strauss; Secretary of War, W. H. Taft.

Tuesday was set aside for the reading of the President's message which took two hours and twenty-five minutes. The House was crowded from pit to dome, and everybody seemed to be an attentive listener. At different times there were hearty hand clapping by both parties in the house. At the beginning of the message many Democrats were pleased on the views of the income tax, and many commented that the President had used many of Democratic planks.

The parts of the message that seemed to be of most interest were those that pertained to the Japanese affairs and the inheritance tax. There was some dis-appointment over the failure of the President to discuss the Panama Canal.

To our readers no doubt the important passage is that dealing with the Lynch law, and the protection of the farmers.

In brief, the most important fact, according to the President's view of lynching, are these:

The epidemic of lynching and mob violence springs up not only in one part of the country but all parts, and no section with wisdom has any right to jeer another section, for it should be busy trying to amend its own shortcomings. As to the crime of rape, the punishment should be death, as in the case of murder, also assault with intent to commit rape should be made a capital crime. But in all cases no matter how heinous they may be there should and must be a

speedy trial and the laws pertaining to the acts will hasten a more speedy execution. But lynching for this one particular crime, causes those to extend lynching in a more broad manner and by this many innocent, are often put to death, and by all means the law must be upheld.

As to the farmer, the message stated in part: "As the business organization has become a necessity in the world, so it is with the farmer, he must organize to protect himself. He must have a chance to become better educated, as by this method he will or can by intimate relationship understand the theory of education and the facts of life."

There were many other subjects dealt upon such as Rail road employees; Merchant Marine; Industrial Training, and Capital and Labor disputes. But the first two were those which we think interest our readers in general.

A special from Wadesboro to the Raleigh News and Observer says that the business of the Wadesboro saloons with dry towns in this State and South Carolina has steadily grown until it has assumed enormous proportions, the daily shipment by express alone amounts to from 250 to 300 gallons. The special explains that most of the booze goes to South Carolina, but that no inconsiderable quantity is consumed in this State. We were under the impression that express companies could not carry whiskey from a wet town and deliver it to parties in a dry town in this State. We suppose it is billed as some other kind of ware instead of "wet" ware. It may be possible, but hardly probable, that every man goes after his own booze.

Several of our exchanges have taken notice of and commented on the large number of real estate transfers recorded weekly in The Robesonian and they have wondered at there being so many of them. Brethren, this does not mean that our citizenship is in a state of unrest and are selling out and moving away. Not at all! It is just a little swapping around among them and lots of it is timber deals. We are glad to say that we hear of very few leaving the county.

It will be of interest to the people hereabouts to know that Spark's Circus was the victim of a railroad wreck one day this week at Robérdel. A couple of horses and a pony were injured and one of the showman a victim. The other show folks attached the blame to the conductor and beat him in to insensibility. This was an unusual as well as cowardly way to get even with the railroad but we feel sure a damage suit will follow.

Some of our delinquent subscribers have already come across with the "long green" and we give them due credit for same, but there are many yet we would be glad to hear from. We don't make these appeals just to fill space, but because we need the "dough."

We understand that a graded school is being taked for Lumberton. We don't suppose there are many towns the size of this with the progressive spirit that are lacking in a graded schools.
