MAXTON NEWS LETTER.

Board of Trustees of Carolina Methodist Seminary Elect Officers and Name Committee--Maxton Paper Changes Name Business Changes--Personals.
Correspondence of The Robesonian.

The board of trustees of the Carolina Methodist Seminary held their first meeting here on Wednesday, Jan. 2nd. The following members of the board were present: Hon. W. H. Neal, L. T. Cottingham, W. N. Everett, Hon. H. L. Godwin, Hon. F. A. Woodard, Rev. S. E. Mercer, Rev. E. McWhorter, J. W. Carter, W. H. Humphrey, A. J. McKinnon and Rev. J. E. Underwood. Judge Walter H. Neal, of Lumberton, was elected chairman of the board of trustees; Mr. A. J. McKinnon, secretary, and L. T. Cottingham treasurer, both of the latter gentlemen being Maxtonians. The following committees were appointed: Executive committee composed of W. H. Neal, chairman; A. J. McKinnon, secretary; Rev. A. P. Tyler, J. W. Carter, Rev. E. McWhorter, W. H. Humphrey, Rev. J. E. Underwood, Rev. G. T. Adams, F. A. Woodard, W. N. Everett and Judge C. C. Lyon; Committee on Charter composed of Judge W. H. Neal, Rev. S. E. Mercer, A. J. McKinnon, G. B. Patterson, H. L. Godwin and F. A. Woodard; Revis. E. McWhorter, S. E. Mercer, J. E. Underwood, Messrs. W. H. Humphrey and W. N. Everett were appointed the committee to select a site for the location of the school. The executive committee also met during the day and decided that the college to be built should cost not less than \$100,000, and to accommodate not less than two hundred girls. Messrs. Q. K. Nimocks, Frank Page and W. R. Land, trustees, tendered their resignations and Messrs. J. E. L. Amfield, O. T. Godwin and W. J. Openurch were elected in their stead. An elaborate dinner was served the trustees at the Maple Shade Inn.

Mr. O. C. Spaulding, cashier of the bank at Stanley Creek, has been elected cashier of the Bank of Maxton, vice Mr. M. W. Cole, resigned, and will soon move his family here to live. Mr. Spaulding will build a handsome home here in the near future.

Mr. J. P. Wiggins has changed the name of the Maxton News to the Maxton Chief. We like the new name for the paper—it not only shows that it is from Maxton but also that which the name suggests—"Mackstown"—(Scotch) and Chief. The name is almost the same as the old one—Scottish Chief and should please our good Scotch people very much.

Mr. M. L. McLean has accepted a position as book-keeper for the A. J. McKinnon Co. and Mr. Arch Currie a position with Currie & Patterson.

Mr. Ervin Luther Biggs died here Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock, death resulting from attack of appendicitis.

Funeral services were held Saturday at noon at the Biggs graveyard, near Rozier, conducted by Rev. I. P. Hedgpeh.
