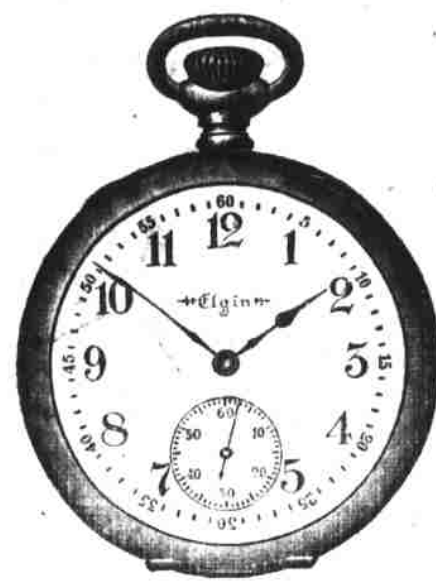

#### Man Bitten by Horse With Glanders Dies.

A strange death is reported from the upper end of the county. Mr. John C. Young, who lives near Stoneville, had a horse, which was suffering with glanders some two or three months ago. No special attention was given to the matter until recently, when two other horses in Mr. Young's farm died with the same disease. A veterinary surgeon was called, who advised the same as was followed. Mrs. Young had been dressing the horses and one of them bit his hand. The wound was very painful, and soon developed into a mass of suppurative sores resembling smallpox, finally causing his death. The neighbors were so frightened at his manner of death that it was with difficulty his body was prepared for burial.

#### State Place in Furniture Manufacturing.

Greenboro Industrial News.

W. E. White, a well-known furniture manufacturer of Mebane, was in the city last night on his way from a visit to the furniture exhibitions which are held every winter in Chicago and Grand Rapids.

When asked in regard to his trip by a representative of the Daily Industrial News, Mr. White modestly said that there was little to tell but that he was certainly proud of the stand that North Carolina was taking in the furniture world. Twice each year, said Mr. White, the leading manufacturers of the country make an exhibit of the product of their factories in these two cities; the exhibitions being also attended by representative of the larger jobbers and wholesale dealers, who do much of their purchasing from the samples there seen.

Six years ago, concluded Mr. White, the North Carolina furniture makers began to take part in these exhibits and have done so ever since. At first their products were almost exclusively of the cheaper grades but the quality of their products has considerably improved and at the present time North Carolina makes a large portion of the medium furniture used in the United States. The eyes of the country, he said, are now turning to the south and in this important branch of manufacture North Carolina stood prominent among the southern states, making perhaps more furniture than all the other southern states combined.

"Everybody in the business knows about North Carolina furniture," said Mr. White, "and a large portion of the sixteen hundred travelers who were in Chicago included the products of our factories in their purchases.
