### COMMISSIONERS IN SESSION.

**Opinion of Board That Court House is a Public Necessity—Ordered That Matter Be Called to Attention of County's Representatives in Present Legislature—Other Matters Passed.**

The board of commissioners was in session Monday.

Those present were J. W. Carter, chairman; D. S. Alderman, A. R. McEachern, A. L. Bullock and C. A. Oliver.

The following business was disposed of:

Ordered by the board that the construction of the court house and the purchase of bonds and its sale to the public be referred to the board of the people attending court and officers in same and on further consideration of reports of the grand juries in respect thereto, it is the opinion of the board that a new court house is a public necessity. It is further ordered that this order be called to the attention of the representatives of Robeson county in Senate and House of Representatives in the present Legislature and reference thereto be had. It is further ordered that it is the opinion of this board that bonds authorized under any legislation that may be had, do not carry interest exceeding 5 per cent annum.

On motion it was ordered that W. D. News be appointed as special surveyor to survey an acre or more by J. W. Butler and others; the county surveyor being disqualified.

Ordered that petition for the establishment of a public road at or near Sinclair Lovett's to Duke's bridge over Lumber river, be and of Sinclair Lovett, Lumber river, Lumber river, Lumber river, J. W. Butler and others of Mrs. A. Nash in Robeson county, as near as possible with a road cut way adjoining from said Sinclair Lovett's to the Rockingham road, near Inman's bridge, be granted. This will be a great convenience to the petitioners, and will make a direct line from the town of Elrod to Pembroke and the most direct line from Raynham to Pembroke. The road superintendent is ordered to lay out and open up same.

Ordered that T. B. Pace be allowed rebate of poll tax in Maxton township.

Ordered that Carolina Telephone and Telegraph Company be allowed rebate of \$11.95 in Red Springs township.

Report of F. C. Jones, superintendent of county roads, received and ordered filed.

Ordered that D. S. Alderman be appointed a committee of one to take in charge the matter of re-building Gilchrist's Bridge over Lumber river, and after consultation with the commissioners of Scotland county, proceed to have the work done.

Petition signed by R. D. Capps and other for the establishment of a public road beginning at a point on Long Branch road and leading to the Lovett road via Kingsdale, granted.

Ordered that Lewis Maxwell be allowed rebate of \$1.36 in S. S. District No. 6, Lumber Bridge.

Petition signed by K. Barnes and others for the establishment of the following road was granted: Beginning at a point near D. H. Atkinson's on the road known as "Dan" road and running west so as to coincide with the eastern end of Main street in the town Proctorville, thence west with Main street to the run of Big Indian Swamp; thence west parallel with the Atlantic

Coast Line Railroad to the short cut road.

Ordered that W. A. McPhaul be paid \$2.00 for surveying public road. To be paid as follows: \$1.00 by White House No. 2 road fund, and \$1.00 by Britts road fund.

Ordered that Archie Davis be paid \$5.00 for burying Joel Lovett, a pauper.

Ordered that Dock Carmichael be paid \$5.00 for burying John ...

Ordered that E. C. McNeill be paid \$36.75 for wood ...

Ordered that the town of Lumberton be paid \$11.92 for lights and lamps for court house, January 1st to February 1st, 1937.

Ordered that the resignations of A. T. Parmele and A. Nash as members of the finance committee, be not accepted.

Ordered that E. C. McNeill be allowed \$37.50 for summoning jurors in case of State vs. Jno. Locklear.

Ordered that Mrs. L. C. Inman be allowed rebate on \$290.00 in White House township.

Ordered that B. N. Evans be allowed rebate on \$250.00 in White House township.

Ordered that the following road reports be accepted: Blue Springs, Lumber Bridge, White House, Lumberton, Saddle Tree, Sterngs, Red Springs, Alfordsville, Ralt Swamp, Thompson, Rocksville, Britts, Back Swamp, Wisharts and Maxton.

At the conclusion of the above business, the Board adjourned to meet again Tuesday, February 15th, 1937.

An \$18,000,000 mortgage was filed in the office of Clerk of Supreme Court J. A. Russell in Charlotte, Tuesday, the Seaboard Air Line Railway Company being the mortgagor and the Mort Trust Company and James L. Burke, trustee, mortgagee. The mortgage provides for an issue of \$18,000,000 worth of five per cent 30 year gold bonds due February 1st, 1937, and which are for the purpose of defraying the cost of mortgage and equipping the Seaboard Air Line Railway lines in several Southern States. The security of the mortgage is the entire system of the Seaboard Air Line Railway.
