Messrs. Alex. R. Roper and Will Maxwell, of Lumberton, visited friends in this community Sunday.

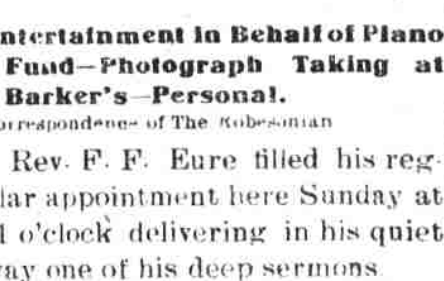
Little Misses Mittie and Alma Russ, who were detained at home a portion of last week on account of illness, are in school again.
