

CHARGED WITH ELSPING.

Joseph H. Oxendine Will be Tried for Eloping With Willis Locklear's Wile.

Joseph H. Oxendine, a Crostan, was arraigned here Tuesday before !Squire G. T. Cox. charged with eloping with Maggie Locklear, another Croatan, the wife of Willis Locklear, of Saddle Tree township, The hearing was postponed until Tuesday of next week and Oxendine gave \$400 bond for his appearance then.

Willis Locklear is a well-to-do Croatan, being worth a few Capt, McBryde. thousand dollars. He has emploved Messrs. Wishart & Shaw and McIntyre & Lawrence to prosecute Oxendine. It will be alleged by the prosecution that Oxendine eloped with Maggie Locklear to Alabama the first of January and that they have since lived there. Oxendine was located there some time ago, was arrested and held until the necessary requisition papers were pro-thousand Confederate Soldiers of cured to bring him here, which Robeson County. was done Tuesday.

### Western Union Increases Salary 10 Per Cent.

Mr. S. H. Hamilton, manager of the local office of the Western Union Telegraph Co., has received the following telegram from

Supt. Maxwell, of this division: "The following telegram received today from General Superintendent Levin: This Company has received petitions from sixteen offices in the West and Southwest within the last sixty days, asking for an increase of 10 per cent. in salary of employes. These petitions have been given careful consideration, bearing in mind that the Company could not discriminate in favor of a few offices, but that any action taken should be general. In this connection it has been necessary to consider the enormously increased cost of all kinds of telegraph material which in many cases has been from 50 to 100 per cent. while tariff rates on messages and other traffic are very low in view of the demand of the public for ever increasing facilities and more rapid service, in fact, many of these rates are relics of former Unions competition and are unprofitable. Notwithstanding these facts, the company has decided to increase the salaries of operators and managers at all of its independ-10 per cent from March 1st. DETAILS OF MONUMENT. Executive Committee Meets and Decides on inscription, Etc.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Veteran Association of the 14th inst, the resignation of Capt. Tom McBryde, as a member of the committee, was regretfully accepted. Capt. Bryde is a true and loyal veteran and to him is largely due the movement to erect a monument to the Confederate Soldiers of Robeson county. Judge T. A. McNeill was elected chairman, and Mr. D. E. McBryde, a member of the committee to fill vacancies caused by resignation of

Gov. R. B. Glenn was chosen to deliver the address at the unveiling of the monument, May 10th, and Miss McBryde, daughter of Capt. McBride, to unveil

The following inscriptions and emblems were selected for the monument: On the South side of the die: "Erected under the auspices of the United Daughters of the Confederacy in loving memory of the two

"1861—1865."

On the North side of large Cap 1861" in large raised letters.

West side of top Cap "C.S.A." West side of bottom spire, the confederate flag with broken

West side of large Cap' 1865"

West side of top base, "Our East side of bottom spire,

Crossed guns. East side of die, the following inscription:

This marble minstrel's voiceless stone In deathlesss song shall tell, When many a vanished age hath flows

On fame's eternal camping ground, Their silent tents are spread, And glory guards with solem round, The bivouse of the dead.

Trains Will be Reinstatted. Charlotte Observer, 21st.

A decision on the part of the Seaboard Air Line Railroad which will be of interest and pleasure to Charlotte people was made known yesterday to Mr. Joseph Ker, Jr., city passenger agent. The announcement was to the effect that trains Nos. 39, 40, 44 and 45 will be reinstated in the early spring. Nos 44 and 45 will be put on the road between Charlotte and Shelby. One reason for the re-establishment of these trains was the desire of the Seaboard to make adequate pro visions for handling the great amount of extra passenger busi ness that will be brought forth S.
