### Road Supervisors Meet and Organize.

Messrs. A. E. White, of Lumberton, H. C. McNair, of Maxton, and Mr. W. A. Graham, of Lumber Bridge, composing the county board of road supervisors, met here Monday and organized by electing Mr. White chairman and Mr. J. H. McNeill, secretary. Another regular meeting will be held here Monday and all the township supervisors, keeper of the chain gang and the county road superintendent have been served with notice to be present with the board.

The road law of the county was so amended by the Legislature as to put the execution and administration of the law in the hands of the above named board of supervisors, as was embodied in a resolution of the Democratic convention.

Under the law now as amended the tax is reduced from 25 to 20 cents on \$100 worth of property and from 75 to 60 cents on the poll. Also, the work of the chain gang will hereafter be entirely in hands of the board of supervisors, and expenses are to be paid out of road fund instead of county funds.
