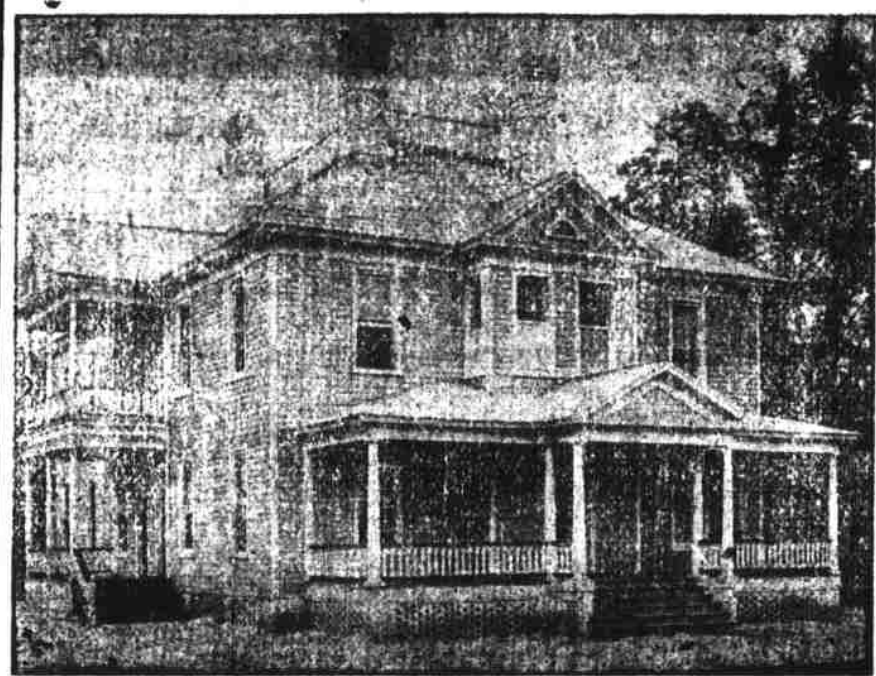

### Work of Road Supervisors.

The county board of road supervisors, at their meeting Monday, transacted the following business:

Supervisors for townships were appointed as follows: Alfordville, L. E. Ammons; Blue Springs, D. J. Dalton; Lumberton, S. G. Prevatt; Saddle Tree, D. S. Carlyle; Thompson's, J. B. McLeod, for all of said township lying east of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad and L. E. Ammons for all of township west of said railroad. Supervisors appointed at the last meeting of the board presented their bond and qualified.

Action on petition for road in Sterling township was postponed until May meeting.

It was ordered by the board that the following banks be designated for the treasurer to deposit the road funds in:

For the funds of Blue Springs, Burnt Swamp, Lumber Bridge, Parkton and Red Springs townships, the Bank of Red Springs; Smiths, Maxton and Alfordville township, the Bank of Maxton; Thompson township, the Bank of Rowland; White House and Sterlings townships, the Bank of Ashpole.

On motion it was ordered that each supervisor while at work on the public roads of his township be paid \$2 per day and that ten hours constitute a day's work.

The salary of W. K. Brock and R. D. Lancaster, keepers of the chain gang, were increased from \$45 to \$50 per month.

Eli Phillips was paid \$14.75 for work done on the roads of Lumberton township.

Ordered by the board that \$500 be assessed against the different townships for the general road fund.

On motion it was ordered that townships where the chain gang works shall be taxed with the price of \$1 per day for each convict worked, together with the salaries of the keepers and the guards and also be charged with the expenses of moving the chain gang to the township where they are to work, and also the funds so created shall be paid into the general road funds of the county.

Mr. A. J. McKinnon was chosen chief Marshal for the occasion; Mr. R. D. Caldwell, chairman of committee on dinner; Mr. G. B. Patterson, chairman of the committee on music; Mr. C. B. Townsend, chairman of committee on finance; Mr. A. E. White, chairman of committee on platform. A meeting of the committee will be held Monday to complete the programme.

The management for the occasion will do everything in its power to make the event a big success.

### Engine Coming.

The engine for Virginia & Carolina Southern railroad, which is being built from Lumberton, will arrive here the early part of next week. It spent Friday night in Fayetteville and left next day for Aberdeen where it will collect some work cars to bring along with it. The new rails are also enroute and will be here next week. The rails are sixty-pound and the engine is 45 horse power. Work will begin soon in laying the rails and constructing the road.
