MAXTON NEWS LETTER.

Fayetteville Presbytery in Session—Mrs. K. Steele Monroe Dead—Business Notes

The first session of Fayetteville Presbytery convened here yesterday morning at 11 o'clock in the new Presbyterian church. Rev. Mr. Roberts, of Carthage, the retiring moderator, preached the opening sermon which was a very able one. A large number of ministers and delegates were present at the opening and nearly all the others expected, arrived last night. Mr. J. H. Guthrie, an elder, was elected moderator. A business session was held after the sermon yesterday morning and also another one at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Rev. A. W. Crawford, of Indian Territory, Rev. J. H. Dixon, of Atlanta, Ga., and Rev. J. M. McLain, of Concord, were received into the Presbytery. Rev. J. M. Rose, D. D., of Laurinburg preached a very able sermon at the night service taking as his subject how to secure more of the young men for the ministry. It was ordered by the Presbytery to have his sermon printed in pamphlet form and sent to the ministers in the North Carolina Synod. The homes here are all supplied with delegates.

Mrs. K. Steele Monroe, formerly Miss Nina McGirt, died at her home near town yesterday after an illness of about 6 weeks. She had been married less than a year and her death is all the more sad. She is survived by her husband and a father and mother and a large number of relatives. She was about 24 years of age and a very popular young lady every where she was known. Funeral services will be conducted at the residence and the interment will take place at Ashpole church.

Another sad death occurred yesterday when the wife of Mr. W. W. McGirt passed away. She had been sick for some time and while her death was not altogether unexpected yet it came as a shock to her friends. She leaves a husband and several young children, both boys and girls to mourn her loss.

It is noted in today's papers that the second regiment of the North Carolina National Guard, of which this company is a part, will encamp at Jamestown during the Exposition. Report of Commissioners.

The board of county commissioners held a meeting Monday morning. Those present were J. W. Carter, chairman; D. S. Alderman, A. R. McEachern and A. L. Bullock.

On motion it was ordered that the advisory committee provided for in a bill passed by the recent Legislature, entitled "An act to Authorize the Commissioners of Robeson County to Issue Bonds to Build a Court House," be not confirmed in their appointment.

On motion it was ordered that \$150 be paid Robeson County Medical Society to aid in distributing literature throughout the county.

Ordered that J. S. Thompson be allowed \$4 for clearing obstruction from bridge over Lumber River.

On motion it was ordered by the Board that Wm. Bryant be appointed a special surveyer to survey the entry of land made by M. C. Burney.

Ordered that Alex Sinclair be allowed \$32.50 for building stock law fence.

Ordered that Mack Clarke be allowed \$35 for building stock law fence.

On motion it was ordered that the Board borrow from the First National Bank, \$3,000, to defray the necessary expenses of the county.

Ordered that the following good and lawful men be drawn for the jury box of Robeson county to serve as jurors at May term of court, beginning Monday May 20th.

The Famine in China.

The people of China are called upon to suffer intensely from a famine. For forty days without break, the waters overflowed a hundred miles to the east and west, to the north and south, submerging farms, destroying crops, uprooting houses and leaving despair, destruction and starvation in their track. So intense is the suffering now that parents kill their children by throwing them in the rivers, or by poison, then take their own lives. The aged people are being drowned to prevent the agony of starvation, people are dying in the fields, in the streets. Many parents sell their children for a mere pittance, and then suffer doubly, from both hunger and heart ache. Fifteen million people are in the grasp of the famine, and seven million are help less. Human flesh is being sold for food. Ten cents a day will save a small family, one dollar will save a family of five for a week. All in this blest country of ours are able to contribute something, be it ever so small, to these famishing people.
