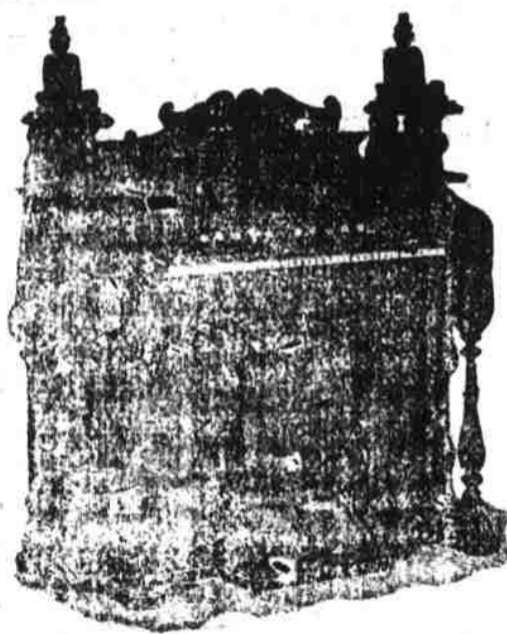

Election Passed off Quietly - R. M. Williams Mayor - Band Preparing to Come to Memorial Exercises.
