OLD FORK GLEANINGS.

Aunt Becky Has Grippe—Fruit Crop Destroyed, Gardens Late.—Stana of Cotton Very Good.

Some weeks have elapsed since my last communication to your paper, owing to the sickness in our family. While the Squire was suffering from an attack of acute indigestion and heart trouble, I was seized suddenly and severely by the master Grippe, from which I have not yet recovered.

There is little local news of interest transpiring here about: every body is very busy on the farms, and the young crops seem to be doing well. Good stands of cotton generally, have been obtained, and the chopping season is in full blast.

We have had some cases of sickness in the Fork recently, mostly among the children, except Mrs. Walter Stubbs, who has been an invalid for many months, and is quite sick at this writing.

The fruit crop in this section is totally destroyed, except perhaps the grape crop, and a few late apples, which will be a great deprivation to the country folks, gardens are backward, owing to the late seasons, and the poultry crop is not ready to harvest yet, so we are having rather a monotony bill of fare these days.

The compliment which Gov. Glenn paid our county, and her people made my heart thrill with patriotic pride; and it was indeed a well-merited tribute to the sobriety and good behaviour of such an immense crowd.

Several Veterans in this section speak of going to Richmond reunion; the Squire would like to there, as his old comrades in arms were all Virginians, and the survivors of his command will doubtless, many of them be present, but his weakly condition debars him from that pleasure. The Turn-out school, under the tutelage of Mr. A. B. Mercer, will close on Thursday p. m. the 16th Inst. A concert by the school will open at 7.30.

Messrs. Norman and Dugald Stuart have gone to Asheville this week, on a visit to Mr. Duncan Stuart, who has been at that place several months and will probably return with these two gentlemen, one of whom, Mr. (Norman) is his father.

We had a couple of agents on the same day last week, one of whom represented a fruit-tree nursery, and the other, Mr. McClure was soliciting subscribers to that splendid paper, "The Christian Observer"—published in Louisville. This young man informed me that he was meeting with much success, and had up to that time secured upward of 500 names in Fayetteville Presbytery.

Arrange to Supply Fish.

Mr. H. L. Godwin, representative for the Sixth Congressional district, writes as follows: My dear Sir:

I desire to advise you that I have arranged with the Bureau of Fisheries at Washington to furnish a supply of fish for the ponds, lakes and streams of this congressional district. In order that a suitable selection of fish may be made the bureau has prepared question blanks to be used by each applicant, fully describing the water to be stocked. I will cheerfully furnish these blanks, on application, to any person desiring fish. Only one application for any particular body of water will be considered by the bureau. From ten to sixty days before hand the applicant is advised of the proposed date of shipment, and other essential particulars, and on the actual date of delivery, or the previous day, a telegram is sent designating the train on which the fish will arrive. Full instructions for the care of the fish en route from the railroad station to the point of deposit will be found upon one of the notices sent to the applicant in advance of the proposed shipment. As it is injudicious to ship any fish by express it is necessary for applicant to meet them at a railroad station which can be conveniently reached by the Bureau's distributing car, or messenger, and provide vessels for transporting them to the water to be stocked. The fish are delivered at the railroad station free of expense.

Death of Mrs. Edmund.

Mrs. Jane Edmund died at her home here Monday night, after an illness of some weeks. For several days prior to her death, her condition was very serious and death was not unexpected. Mrs. Edmund was in her 69th year. A woman of quiet disposition, unassuming and sincere, her presence will be much missed by her children and grand-children, to whom she has devoted her life for years past, and all who knew her esteemed her. Since her girlhood, she has been a consistent member of the Baptist church. Three sons survive her. Messrs. D. F. W. O. and R. O. Edmund. They have the sympathy of our people. The funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon at the residence by Rev. C. H. Durham, and the interment made in the cemetery in East Lumberton, amid a large concourse of sorrowing relatives and friends.

Citizen of Raeford Arrested

Monday afternoon C. C. Holland, 18 years of age, was arrested in Fayetteville by Chief of Police Benton, charged with stealing a watch, pistol and razor from the grip sack of Clarence Pemberton at the station at Raeford last month. Holland was assistant agent and telegraph operator at Raeford, and before that, station agent at Hope Mills. He tried to exchange the watch in Fayetteville, but the watch was recognized by the clerk and Mr. Pemberton was notified. At police headquarters he confessed to the theft of the watch and razor but knew nothing of the pistol. He was held in \$100 bond which he failed to give, and was sent to jail. His father is said to be a prominent physician at Clarkton, Va.
