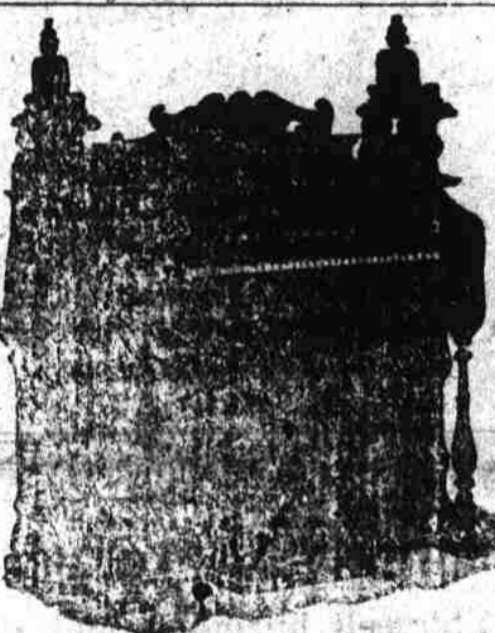

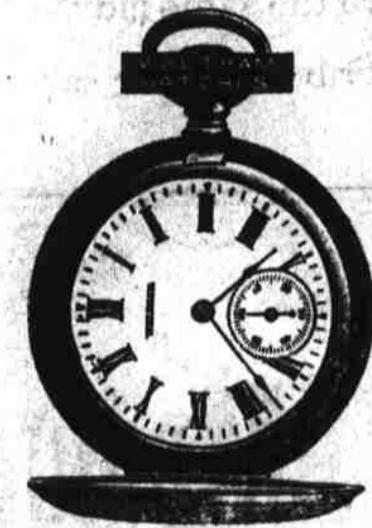

The Report of Commissioners.

The Board of County Commissioners met Monday morning in regular session. Those present were J. W. Carter, chairman; A. R. McEachern, A. L. Bullock, C. A. Oliver and D. S. Alderman. The following business was disposed of.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

Pauper list allowed.

Ordered that Make McCallum, of Back Swamp township, be rebated from paying poll tax for the tax years of 1906 and 1907.

Ordered that W. D. Neves be appointed surveyor to make survey and plats for C. B. Skipper of 8 acres of land in Lumberton township, entry 137,—also entry 139

Ordered that bill of W. H. Humphrey \$5.15 cost in the matter of appointing court superintendent, be paid.

Ordered that D. M. Dean be allowed rebate of 53 cents in Howellsville township. Listed twice.

Ordered that Lillie Harden be allowed \$1. per month for self-support, and put on regular list; that Effie Taylor be allowed \$2. and placed on list.

Ordered that J. H. Floyd be paid \$97.95, keeping jail for May 1907.

Ordered that bill of I. J. Flowers \$65.75, keeping county home for May 1907 be paid.

Ordered that bill of B. G. Walters \$2.65, nails for bridges, be paid.

Ordered that bill of R. R. Barnes, \$6. lumber for bridges on Indian Swamp, be allowed.

Ordered that Alex Jacobs be allowed rebate of \$1.65 special school tax in District No. 3, Burnt Swamp.

Ordered that Carva Jacobs be allowed rebate of \$1.25, special school tax in district 3 Burnt Swamp.

Ordered that Wm. Bryant be appointed special surveyor to survey 250 acres of vacant land recently entered by O. L. Smith, being entry—138.

Ordered that Sallie Jane Moore be admitted to the county home, if her friends so desire.

Mr. A. McL. Morrison is here-by appointed to act in place of J. L. McLean as assessor in Maxton township.

Ordered that W. M. Davis be allowed rebate of \$4.02 in special school district 8, Lumber Bridge.

Ordered that bill of Dr. H. T. Pope \$21.35 salary and medicine for county for month of May, be paid.

Ordered that C. H. Lewis be paid \$2 as poll holder two days in Howellsville township.

Ordered that bill of McEachern, Johnson & McEachern Co. \$73, work on stock law fence, be paid.

Ordered that bill of W. H. Humphrey \$11.50 stationary for the Clerk's office, be allowed.

Ordered that A. R. McEachern be allowed \$15 for three days as commissioner on stock law fence.

Ordered that C. A. Oliver be paid \$28 as county commissioner. D. S. Alderman, \$30; A. L. Bullock, \$28; A. R. McEachern, \$23.60; J. W. Carter, \$58.80; C. A. Oliver, \$28.

Ordered that C. H. Lewis be paid \$50. on bridge over Bear Swamp.

Ordered that bill of W. H. Humphrey, \$91.82 for county be paid.

Ordered that bill of Freeman Printing Company \$1.50 envelopes, be paid.

Ordered that J. V. Dodenhoff be allowed \$2 for repairing lights in jail.

Ordered that Lumberton Electric Light Company be allowed \$1.83 for lights for court house, up stairs; 60 cents for lights in jail; \$4.01 for lights in court house down stairs.

Ordered that E. C. McNeill be allowed \$31.25, conveying L. Thompson to State hospital.

Ordered that E. C. McNeill be allowed \$21.20, conveying Mrs. to Raleigh.

Ordered that J. H. Floyd be allowed \$2.30 supplies for jail.

Ordered that E. C. McNeill be allowed \$20.10, distributing tax books and conveying prisoners to jail.

On motion ordered that E. G. Sipher install lights in the jail as per his proposition.

Ordered that Kate Clark be increased on regular list from \$1.50 to \$3.50 per month.

Ordered that Make L. McRae be allowed \$12.57 for work on county.

Ordered that K. M. Biggs be allowed \$9.30, supplies for jail.

Ordered that Board borrow \$2,500 to be due December 15, 1907, from the First National Bank of Lumberton.

The Board then adjourned to meet again Friday, June 7th, 1907.
