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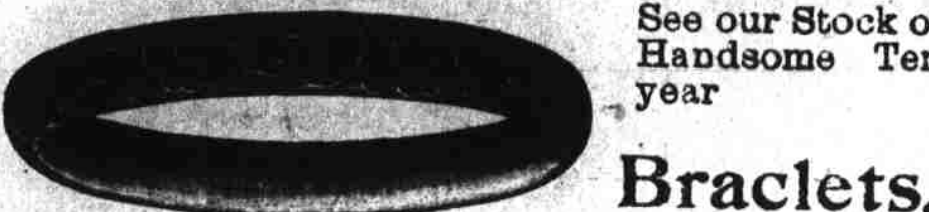

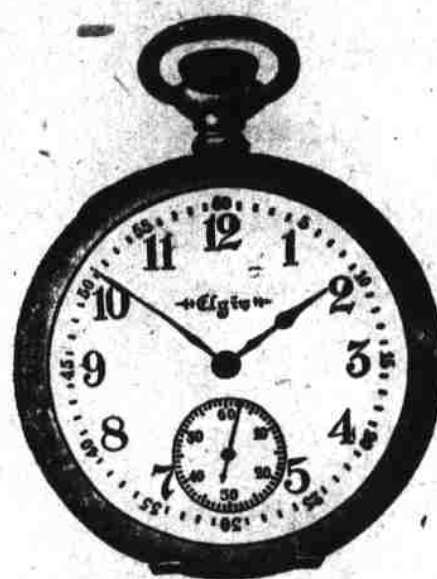

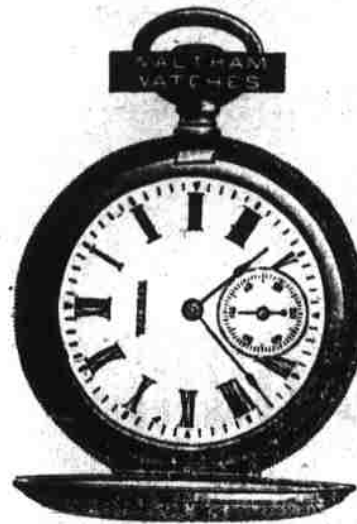

Splendid Meeting Closes—Con-
tract for Proposed Water and
Sewerage System Let—Locals.

The meeting which was held
in the Presbyterian Church

Black closed Monday night. It
was one of the best attended
meetings held here in years. A
large part of the business houses
closed up every day at 11
o'clock, for the morning ser-
vice. A large number of per-
sons joined the Presbyterian
Church and more will join
later. Several will join the
Baptist Church when their
pastor arrives, which will be
about the 1st. of July. Mr.
