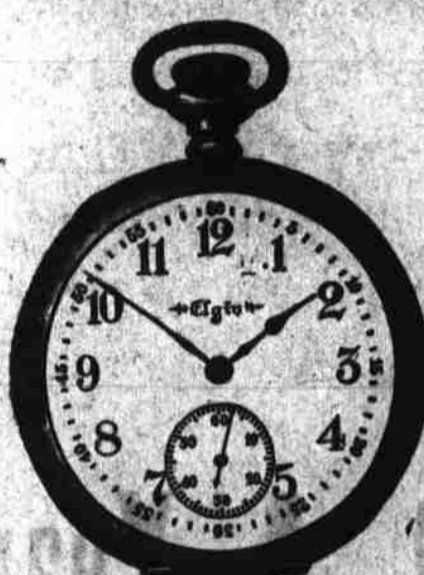

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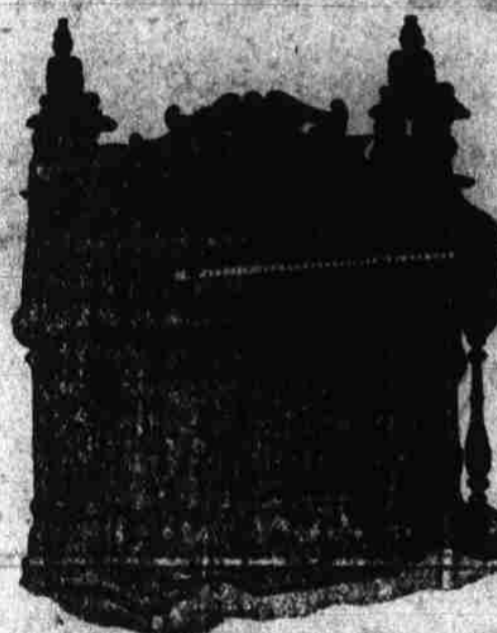

The new president of the North Carolina Retail Merchants' Association began work in Winston Salem about fourteen years ago at fifty cents a day. N. L. Cranford moved to the twin city from Randolph county, carrying with him few things save grit and determination. These two elements, however, combined with a knowledge of book-keeping and a good high school education, were enough to bring him to the fore.

Mr. Cranford's first position was with the tobacco firm of W. B. Taylor & Bro. As assistant book-keeper at fifty cents a day, he made good.

A few years later, after his salary had been raised to \$6 a week, he successfully stood an examination for the railway mail service, and acted as mail clerk for a couple of years. Then he conceived the idea of establishing a clothing store, and, taking a friend in as partner, soon started in the business. From the very beginning the undertaking paid. Today he has one of the finest establishments in North Carolina.

Mr. Cranford attributes his success to advertising. He placed large and expensive display advertisements in Winston-Salem's two daily papers and in the town's large weekly. He kept business before the public. When the dull season came on, he increased his advertising space, until after a while his store experienced no dull season. Honest dealing and advertising paid him.
