The Methodists and Baptists on Baptism.

Charlotte Chronicle. The Baptists and Methodists are in a warm mixup over in Gaston county.

Lawyers may be called to plead the cases of members of the Baptist church who are charged with disturbing religious meetings of the Methodists.

Between Lowell and McAdenville there is a Methodist church in a community of Baptists. For the past two Sundays the Methodist minister has been preaching to his congregation on the baptism of infants, telling his congregation that it is the duty of every parent to have his child baptized while young.

The Baptists heard of the first sermon, which was preached on the 16th instant, and also heard that on the following Sunday, which was last Sunday, another sermon on the same line would be preached. The entire congregation decided they would be present. At their respective homes they would read the Bible late into the night and by the time Sunday came they had many notes at their hands full of references which they had written on notebooks.

Armed with their Bibles and notebooks the Baptists, en masse, went to the Methodist church. When the sermon was begun, and the pastor had gotten into full swing, a Baptist would rise here and there in the congregation and call the pastor down by referring him to the Scripture, and declaring that the baptism of the children should not be, that they should only be baptized after they had reached the years of discretion.

The pastor would continue his sermon and then another Baptist would rise with an objection. The meeting lasted for hours. The Methodists got mad and the Baptist nadder. It was a terrible furor they were all in when the time for breaking finally came.

The Methodists went to the magistrates in the county and had many warrants issued against some of the most prominent Baptists in the community. Things have been at fever-heat ever since. Neighbors would not speak and life-long friends were torn asunder.

The end is not yet in sight. A prominent citizen from Lowell arrived in Charlotte this morning, to engage a well-known and prominent lawyer of this city to defend himself, or one of his Baptist friends, when the trials come up.

The whole of Gaston county seems to be taking part in the matter and if a religious war is heard of it may be located in the vicinity of Lowell or McAdenville.

Chadbourn Citizen Dead.

Mr. Geo. O. Thompson, a venerable and well-known citizen of Chadbourn died in the hospital at Wilmington, Saturday night, following an operation for some organic disease of long duration. He was an Englishman by birth and was 73 years of age. The remains were taken to his home at Chadbourn for interment Sunday.

WOMENS INSTITUTES.

Raft Swamp Church, Thursday, July 18, Barnesville, Friday, July 19.

Those not familiar with the purposes of the institutes being held by our State Department of Agriculture for the benefit of the women in the farm homes may be interested in knowing something of the class of subjects discussed at these meetings. Any or all of the following may be discussed if those present desire:

- The Farm Fruit Garden.
- The Farm Vegetable Garden.
- Farm Poultry.
- Farm Butter Making.
- Beautifying the Home Surroundings.
- Home Conveniences.
- Literature for the Farm Home.
- Home Making.
- Home Nursing.
- Cooking Meats, Vegetables, etc.
- Bread Making.
- Educating the Girls on the Farm.

These are a fair sample of the questions that may be discussed at these womens institutes; and surely they are practical subjects and an intelligent discussion of them cannot fail to be of much benefit to those who attend. If sufficient interest is manifested by the women of this county in these institutes it is the purpose of the Department of Agriculture to make them regular features of the annual Farmers Institute for this county. It will benefit every woman in the county to attend these institutes. She may hear facts that will be of value to her in her work, but if she does not she will still be benefitted just the same, for she needs the day's outing. We hope there will be a large attendance at these institutes.

New Railroad Chartered.

Raleigh, June 24.—The State Charters the Cape Fear, Southport, and Atlantic Railway, with capital stock of a million dollars, all the stockholders being Pennsylvanians. The principal ones are F. S. Pusey, A. J. Fanbros, and Charles F. Anck, of Philadelphia. The company is given power to build forty miles of road, from Southport to any point on the South Carolina line, and to Wilmington with headquarters at Southport, and the road may be operated by or merged into any road already established. The directors swear that at least \$1,000 a mile has been paid in and that they will certainly build and operate the road.

Killed His Brother to Save His Sister.

Baltimore, Md., June 24.—To save the life of his sister, Mrs. Louisa Middleton, who was being severely beaten, William Hauck shot and mortally wounded his brother, Gotthelf Hauck, at the home of Mrs. Middleton, in Gardenville, Baltimore county. Gotthelf died at a hospital in this city, where he had been moved by the brother and sister. William Hauck was committed on the charge of murder by Coroner Caruthers to await the action of the grand jury. It is believed that the prisoner will set up a plea of justifiable homicide and that he will be released in a few days because the only witnesses to the deed say the shooting was necessary to protect the life of Mrs. Middleton, and even of the prisoner himself.
