We guess no man feels more relieved over the happy ending of the railroad controversy than Judge Pritchard, for we guess that he has felt very much like a man would feel who had suddenly and unthoughtfully grabbed a lightning flash by the tail—sorry he took hold, and did not know how to turn loose or what to do with it.

Adverting to what The Robesonian had to say last week about the fact that the county board of audit and finance refuses to show its records, The Red Springs Citizen says that the Robesonian feels a personal slight or grievance.

WHY NOT THE WRITTEN LAW?

Prof. E. W. Timberlake, Jr., of Wake Forest college, in his paper on the "Unwritten Law" before the North Carolina Bar Association said:

The purpose of this paper is to enter a plea for the "orderliness and security of our social system." It would perhaps be not unwise for our law-makers to take into consideration the question whether or not the present legal remedies against the encroachment upon family purity are proportionate to the enormity of the offense.

I do not wish to be understood as going to the extent of advocating so far-reaching a step, but as merely advocating the suggestion of a problem which is undoubtedly confronting the profession at the present time.

The law provides the death penalty for crimes that are, in our opinion, not a whit less heinous. We take no stock in the "unwritten law," but it might indeed be well to consider if it would not be best to make this concession to public opinion.

RAILROAD GIVE IN.

New Rate Law Will be Observed—Terms Agreed on Saturday—All Indictments and Prosecutions Now Pending Against Southern to be Stopped.

At a conference in Governor Glenn's office in Raleigh Saturday, between Gov. Glenn and Southern Ry., and Atlantic Coast Line officials, the rate law fight came to an end and the railroads will put the 2 1/2-cent rate into effect as soon as they can figure the new schedules.

THE AGREEMENT.

"First, the railway puts the 2 1/2-cent rate into effect not later than August 5th next. "Second, the State to appeal from Judge Pritchard's order discharging parties in Asheville on writ of habeas corpus. "Third, the Southern Railway to appeal to the State Supreme Court in the Wake county case, and if the case is decided against it to take it to the United States Supreme Court. "Fourth, that both sides consent to all indictments and prosecutions now pending to be dismissed and no others to be instituted for any alleged violation of the rate law. "Fifth, the State, at its option to either the Atlantic Coast Line in one case. "Sixth, all indictments and prosecutions now pending to be dismissed and no others to be instituted for any alleged violation of the rate law. "Seventh, the Governor advises all persons against bringing any penalty suit pending final determination of the question involved and asks the people as a whole to desist in this regard. "Eighth, the suit pending to

fore Judge Pritchard at Asheville to be diligently prosecuted without the State's having any question of jurisdiction.

President Finley Arrested and Released.

President Finley, of the Southern Railway, was arrested at Asheville Saturday on a warrant sworn out at the instance of Police Justice Reynolds. Before Mr. Finley was taken from the Battery Park Hotel, however, a United States Deputy Marshal served a writ from the United States Circuit Court on the police officer and Mr. Finley was taken to the United States Federal building, where Judge Pritchard opened court and subsequently ordered the release of the arrested president of the Southern.

Mr. Humphrey Says That Charge That He Had Anything to Do With the Act to Validate Certain Probate Deeds is Malicious.

Since handing you extract of bill passed by our last Legislature relative to notaries public, I have learned from a reliable source that some person or persons are agitating the suggestion that I had the bill passed. I ask of you space to say that no charge ever made against any one was further from the truth. I had not the slightest idea that any one ever thought of having such a law passed until I discovered it in the Acts which I just received this week.

I felt when I read it that some clerk of the court must have had it passed, but while I try to look after my own interest in all legitimate ways, yet I have never felt driven to have a law passed that would jeopardize the interest of others as this does, just to get a few paltry dollars for myself.

The charge is too ridiculous, it seems to me, to people who know me, to merit even a denial.

The only public law that I asked to be passed, I placed in the hands of Col's. N. A. McLean and E. F. McRae, after having submitted it to our county attorney, Mr. E. J. Britt, and getting his sanction, and it only adds Robeson to the list of counties in which the officers and witnesses will be entitled to their half fees in criminal actions, just the same if the grand jurors return "not a true bill" as when a "true bill" is found.

Has any body any objection to this?
