In a game of ball between Lumberton and Kingsdale Saturday afternoon, Lumberton won by a score of 8 to 5.

At a meeting of the graded school board Thursday afternoon Miss Minnie Arent, of Morganton, was elected to take charge of the sixth and seventh grades.

A meeting of the directors of the Robeson County Loan & Trust Co. was held in the company office here Thursday. A semi-annual dividend of 4 per cent. was declared.
