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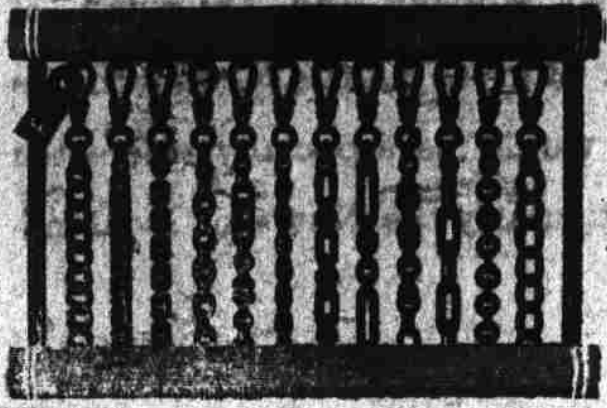

### STATE NEWS.

The Governor and Council of State have granted a request for 50 convicts to work on the Matamuskeet Ry., which will be run from Washington to Englehardt, in Hyde county.

The Frederick Houston Company, operating Cumberland Mills on Beaver creek, near Fayetteville, will at once erect another mill of large capacity. It will be built of re-inforced concrete.

Matthew Sewell, Douglas Page and O. B. Strickland, white men, were arrested Saturday at Fayetteville charged with the burglary Friday night of three residences on Massey Hill in the southern suburbs of the city.

It is reported that Prof. J. Allen Holt, one of the principals of Oak Ridge Institute, is being importuned by many of his friends to run for Congress in the fifth district. Prof. Holt represented Guilford county in the last Legislature.

A dispatch from Morehead City states that Mr. W. L. Kennedy, of Falling Creek, went out fishing alone on the 1st, and caught with hook and line 146 mackerel, 183 trout, 75 croakers and 3 blue fish, the total weighing 500 pounds.
