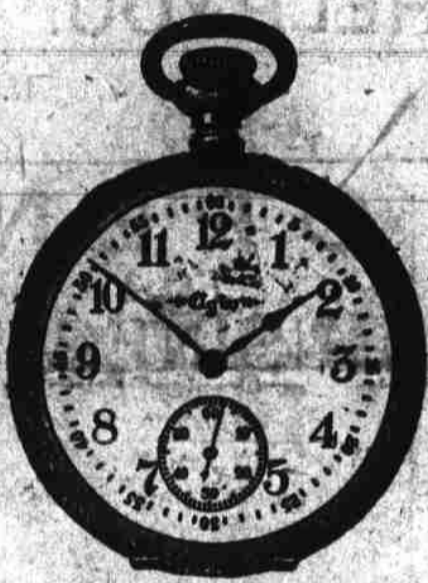

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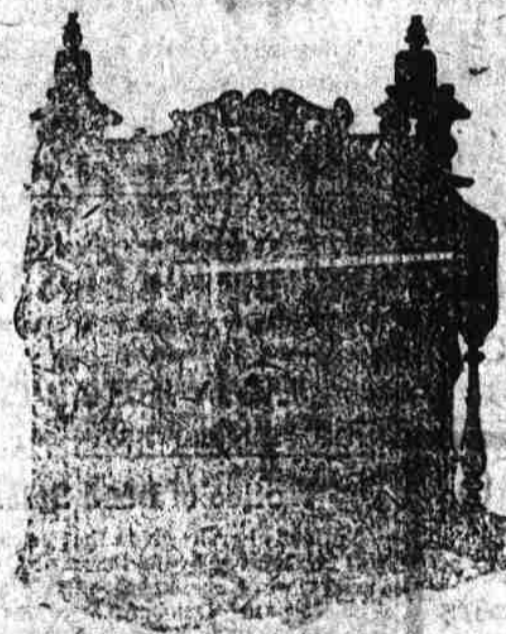

CHARLOTTE OBSERVER FIRE.

Newspaper Gets off Light but Printing House Sustains Heavy Loss—Deaf and Dumb Boy Burned to Death.

About 1:20 o'clock Monday morning fire was discovered in the matrix store room of The Charlotte Observer, which is on third floor of The Observer building, and that floor and the one above were gutted. Damage to the extent of \$25,000 was done.

The composing room and bindery of The Charlotte Observer Co., were wrecked. All of the material used there by the Printing House was wrecked, including a \$4,000 Mergenthaler linotype machine and four platen presses. The newspaper mechanical appliances, located on the second floor and the machinery in the press rooms were not damaged materially except by water. The paper used the plant of the Charlotte News, which was immediately tendered, and did not miss an issue.

A very sad incident in connection with the fire was the burning to death of George Wilson, a deaf and dumb boy about 15 years old, who had voluntarily taken up at The Observer office. The poor fellow was in the habit of sleeping in the room on the third floor, where the fire originated, and when he discovered his danger it was too late to escape, and he was powerless to make his danger known. He was literally roasted to death.

The origin of the fire is not known.
