DOWN IN RICH ROBESON.

A Goodly Land—Would Make a Good Size Kingdom—The Flood Must Have Taken Soil From the Nile Delta and Mixed It With the Soil of Robeson—Rev. J. N. Cole Visits Robeson and Writes of Its Size and Richness and a People.

I spent last Sunday down in rich Robeson. What a goodly land that is—and there is so much of it! It would make a good size kingdom. If Uncle Sam ever gets into a foreign war all he will have to do will be to call on Robeson. She can furnish the men and she can feed a vast army. When the flood came it must have taken soil from the Nile Delta or from some rich lands of the east, and mixed it with the soil of Robeson. I never think of Robeson without thinking what I would have missed in it if I had never come this way—and I had been sometime on the journey before I ever got to Robeson. Here I have found friends that have added much happiness to my life, and doubly so, for they are also friends of the Orphanage. It was a pleasure to me last Saturday to take the train for Robeson. Barker and Regan, two great churches on the East Robeson Circuit were my objective points.

I arrived at Lumberton late Saturday night and found my room and bed waiting for me in the home of Col. W. H. Humphrey. Where can the minister of Christ find a heartier welcome and where is there a home more loyal to the Church and more ready to serve the King's business? I was thankful to turn in again at that open door, and to sleep again under that roof where I have had many a delightful pastime and much good fellowship. These are the King's servants, and the King's business is much in their thought. Sunday was one of those ideal October Sundays. Brother Humphrey took me a round of twenty-five miles—first to Barker's then to Regan—two great congregations worshipping in elegant new churches—where we preached and talked Orphanage—then back to Lumberton in time for evening service. Twenty-five miles and three sermons and the Orphanage appeal each time—this made our Sabbath day's journey and work. Barker's and Regan show signs of an abounding life and of true devotion to Christ. It was a real happiness to me to be with these good people. Watch our Orphanage column and see these two churches enroll themselves for the support of an orphan each year. R. H. Bure is the popular pastor and he is doing a successful year's work.

At Lumberton at the evening hour we met a cordial welcome and every proper courtesy from its warm-hearted and elegant young pastor. It was a delight to stand in the midst of these Lumberton Methodists and to talk to them about the things of God. They are as loyal and true to Christ and to his Church as any company that ever went upon the field—and the Orphanage has had no truer friends. Lumberton Sunday-school has long carried the banner and has given inspiration to our cause at many points in the field. If every superintendent were like John Pittman and every Sunday-school like our Lumberton friends, in a few years our Orphanage would be the State's greatest institution.

AGREINOUS CRIME.

A Woman Robbed, Assaulted and Murdered and an Effort Made to Save her Body.

Miss Mary Ann Harper, who had lived alone near Troy since the death of her father 15 or 20 years ago, was found last Monday morning lying across the hearth at her home with all her clothes burned off, the body charred and her skull broken in two or three places. A Troy dispatch of the 23d to the Charlotte Observer tells of the murder as follows:

"The bad in her room showed she had retired for the night, as her comb were found on the pillow; also her shoes had been taken off her feet. Blood was found on the bed and also on a hammer in the room, which showed conclusively that this was the instrument used to take her life."

She was evidently murdered in her bed, where she was probably assaulted and robbed, and the body placed by her assailant across the fireplace with the hope that the fire would probably burn the body beyond recognition and probably burn the house and thus cover up his tracks. No arrests have been made yet, though more than one person will probably be implicated. Feeling runs high in that neighborhood, though no trouble is anticipated. Miss Harper was a highly respected lady. She was the half sister of Mr. John L. Stuart, of Star, this State."
