THE PRESIDENT EXPLAINS.

President at Roosevelt Issues Letter Stating Why "In God We Trust" Has Been Dropped from Gold Coins—Does Not Approve of It and There is No Withdrawal in Law for It.

In answer to one of the numerous protests which have been received at the White House against the new gold coins which have been coined without the words "In God We Trust," President Roosevelt has written a letter which he to-day made public. The letter follows:

"When the question of the new coinage came up, we looked into the law and found there was no warrant therein for putting 'In God We Trust' on the coins as in the custom, although without legal warrant, had grown up. However, I might have felt at liberty to keep the inscription had I approved of its being on the coin. But as I did not approve of it, I did not direct that it should again be put on. Of course the matter of the law is absolutely in the hands of Congress and any direction of Congress in the matter will be immediately obeyed. At present as I have said there is no warrant in law for the inscription.

DOES NO GOOD.

"My own feeling in the matter is due to my very firm conviction that to put such a motto on coins or to use it in any kindred manner, not only does no good, but does positive harm, and is in effect irreverence, which comes dangerously close to sacrilege. A beautiful and solemn sentiment such as the one in question should be treated and uttered only with that fine reverence which necessarily implies a certain exaltation of spirit. Any use which tends to secure its being treated in a spirit of levity is from every standpoint profoundly to be regretted.

"It is a motto which it is indeed well to have inscribed on our great national monuments, in our temples of justice, in our legislative halls, and in buildings such as those at West Point, and Annapolis—in short wherever it will tend to arouse and inspire a lofty emotion in those who look thereon. But it seems to me in no wise to cheapen such a motto by use on coins, just as it would be to cheapen it by use on postage stamps or in advertisements.

SOURCE OF JEER AND RIDICULE.

"As regards the use of coinage we have actual experience by which to go. In all my life I have never heard any high-sounding or reverent words being used on the coins or show any signs of its having appealed to any high emotion in him, but I have literally hundreds of times heard it used as an occasion of, and incitement to, the sneering and ridicule which it is above all things undesirable that so beautiful and exalted a phrase should excite.

"For example throughout the long contest extending over several decades on the free coinage question, the existence of this motto on the coins was a constant source of jest and ridicule, and this was unavoidable. Every one must remember the innumerable cartoons and articles based on phrases like 'In God We Trust for the eight cents,' 'In God We Trust for the short weight,' 'In God We Trust for thirty-seven cents we do not pay,' and so forth. Surely I am within bounds when I say that a use of the phrase which invites constant levity of this type is most undesirable. It Congress alters the law and directs me to replace on the coins the sentence in question, the direction will be immediately put into effect, but I very sincerely hope that the religious sentiment of the country, the spirit of reverence in the country will prevent any such action being taken.

Spectacles For Cows.

A Russian firm which manufactures optical goods has just completed an order for 40,000 pairs of glasses to be worn by cows. 119 YEARS OF CONGRESS.

Interesting Figures Showing Some of the Things That Have Occurred.

Since the first Congress met in 1789, 118 years ago, there have been 134 sessions of the national body of lawmakers. There have been 119 regular and fifteen extra sessions; thirty-nine different Speakers and Speakers pro tempore; and twenty-five clerks. The longest regular sitting was the first session of the Fiftieth Congress, which met December 5, 1887, and adjourned October 20, 1888, a period of 321 days. Other long sessions were the first of the Fifty-first Congress, 304 days, and the first of the Thirty-first, 302 days.

The second regular sessions of each Congress are always short, both houses assembling according to law on the first Monday in December and adjourning by limitation on the 4th of the following March. These sessions last from ninety to ninety-five days. Aside from the shortest ever held was the first session of the Thirtieth Congress, which covered 184 days and came immediately after an extra session. Other notably short sessions were during the Fifteenth Congress, 141 days; the Fifty-eighth, 144 days; the Fourteenth, 148 days; the Eleventh, 156 days; and the Fifty-fifth, 184 days.

Extra sessions are as old as Congress itself, the first having been called together January 4, 1790, a little over three months after the first session ever held came to a close. Next came the extra session of the Fifth Congress, then other during the Eleventh and Thirteenth, after which there was a lapse of twenty-four years before it was deemed necessary to meet more than twice in two years. The next extra session came with the Thirty-fourth Congress, nearly fifteen years later.

Others were during the Thirty-seventh, Fortieth, Forty-first, Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Fifty-third, Fifty-fifth, and Fifty-eighth Congresses.

The longest extra session was during the First Congress and continued 221 days. The next was that of the Fifty-fifth Congress and lasted 142 days. The shortest was of ten days' duration, during the life of the Thirty-fourth Congress. Altogether Congress has, since its beginning, been in extra session 1,085 days, or about three years.

Only seventeen States have furnished Speakers of the House of Representatives, Pennsylvania leads with five, Massachusetts, Virginia, and Kentucky coming next with four each. Other States have been represented as follows: New York, three; Indiana, three; Tennessee, two; New Jersey, two; Georgia, two; Maine, two; South Carolina, two, and Connecticut, Maryland, North Carolina, Ohio, Iowa, and Illinois have each sent a man to the Speaker's chair.

Jas. G. Blaine of Maine, was Speaker for eight sessions—longer than any other man ever presided over the deliberations of the House. Schuyler Colfax and Samuel J. Randall each occupied the Speaker's chair for seven sessions. John Bell, of Tennessee, was Speaker for ninety-three days, having been elected to fill the unexpired term of Andrew Stevenson, of Virginia. Mr. Bell's term is the shortest on record.

Only two Speakers resigned—Henry Clay and Andrew Stevenson. Mr. Clay sent in his resignation by mail, October 20, 1820, during a recess, and was succeeded by John W. Taylor, of New York. Mr. Stevenson resigned June 2, 1834, and was succeeded by John Bell.

Marvelous Rescue of Miner Who Had Been Buried for 47 Hours—Wife and Children Mourned Him as Dead—Men Worked Hard to Reach Him.

Imprisoned for 37 hours, several hundred feet beneath the surface of the earth almost directly under his own home where his wife and children mourned for him as dead, Michael McCabe, of Gilberton, was today taken from his tomb in the Draper mine barely alive after one of the most marvelous rescues in the history of anthracite mining.

Since Saturday afternoon when the top of the chamber in which he was working caved in and caused a rush of culm and water from the surface, relays of workmen toiled unceasingly to reach him.

Shortly after midnight the rescuers detected a scratching noise which told them that McCabe was still living and with renewed vigor fresh reliefs were put to work and at 5 o'clock this morning he was reached.

He had not changed his position from the time the rush had occurred as he feared that by moving about another rush of culm might start which would end his life.

When rescued he said he thought he had been imprisoned for at least a week and was so weak for want of water and food that he could scarcely speak. He was taken to his home where the house of mourning was changed to one of rejoicing.

Arrangements were made last night to bore a hole in the hope of reaching the entombed miner and supplying him with water and food until his rescue could be made in case he still lived.
