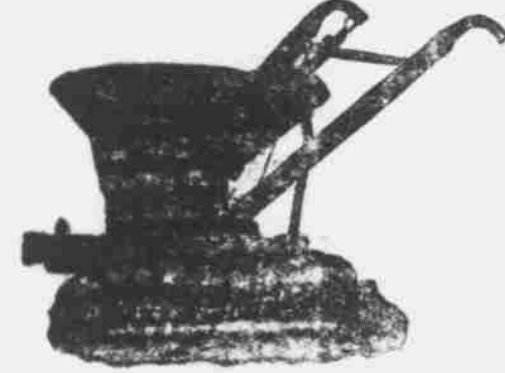

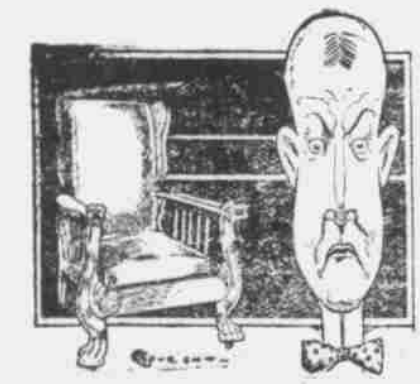

GREAT DAY AT MAXTON.

Corner Stone of Carolina Methodist College Laid by Masons—Ideal Day For the Ceremony and a Goodly Crowd Gathered—Officers of the Grand Lodge—The Speech of General Julian S. Carr, the Orator of the Day, a Gem—Beautiful Dinner Served to Thousands on the College Grounds—A Red-Letter Day for Maxton and Ye Masons.

A goodly crowd of the best people in the land gathered at Maxton on Thursday, April 2nd, to do honor to the Carolina Methodist College, the great institution that has been projected in this growing and thriving community.

No finer day could have been made to order and there was only one drawback to the happy and festive occasion—the unavoidable absence of the Hon. S. M. Gattis, the Grand Lodge Master of the Grand Lodge of Ye Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons of the State of North Carolina. This in no way interfered, however, with the proceedings of the day, as his place was ably filled by his deputy, W. H. McLaurin, of Laurinburg.

At ten o'clock, a. m., the Grand Lodge was opened in the auditorium of the graded school building with the following officers: W. H. McLaurin as Grand Master; Hon. G. B. Patterson as Deputy Grand Master; J. P. McNeill as Sr. Grand Warden; W. H. Harding as Jr. Grand Warden; Capt. John Duckett as Grand Treasurer; A. S. Webb as Grand Secretary; E. H. Bradley as Grand Tyler; N. T. McLean as Sr. Grand Deacon; J. T. Staunton as Jr. Grand Deacon; L. M. Cook as Grand Marshal; F. L. Bundy as Grand Steward; John Stansel as Grand Steward; J. E. Underwood as Grand Chaplain; Euclid McWhorter as Grand Lecturer; Geo. B. McLeod as Bearer of the Great Lights; W. H. Graham as Grand Sword Bearer; W. H. Humphrey as Grand Pursuivant.

There were present about 200 Craftsmen, the largest delegations coming from Lumberton, Red Springs, Laurinburg and Clio, S. C.

A procession was formed by the Grand Marshal, L. M. Cook. The same was headed by Maxton's crack band, which has no equal between the mountains and the sea. The best was saved for the last and the rear was brought up by Maxton's joy and pride, 150 graded school children. The march was taken up and the line proceeded to College Place. The band rendered one of its choicest selections and then the children were marched on the platform, where they did themselves proud in the enthusiastic way in which they rendered "Ho for Carolina."

The chief architect, Mr. J. C. Parish, was then called to the front and asked to place the stone. The Grand Master called his Grand Officers about him and proceeded to lay the same according to the customs and usages of ye ancient Brethren and the laws made and provided for the same, with the corn for nourishment, oil of joy and wine of gladness. There were deposited in the stone: the Book of Holy Writ, the book of Discipline of the Methodist Church, a History of the Local Churches, a Registry of Visiting Masons, a copy of the Deeds to the College Property, a history and roll of Maxton Lodge No. 417, A. F. & A. M., a copy of the Proceedings of the Grand Lodge, Local Papers, Compositions by School Children, and a Roll of the Graded School.

The audience proceeded to the grove in rear of the Administration Building, where a stand and comfortable seats were provided. Col. E. F. McRae was called on to introduce the orator of the day and did so with his usual grace and Irishman story. In

RECLAMATION OF SWAMP LAND.

An Exhaustive Discussion of the subject by Representative Godwin.

Representative Godwin made one day last week a very comprehensive speech in the House upon "The Reclamation of the Swamp Lands of North Carolina." His speech is an exhaustive discussion on the subject. The reclamation of the swamp lands, he said, is the antithesis of the irrigation of arid lands; and the government having succeeded with the irrigation in the Western States, the farmers of the Eastern States are demanding drainage legislation. He calls attention to the fact that the Secretary of the Department of Agriculture, in his last report, says that farm drainage is a question of national interest and importance.

The area of swamp lands in North Carolina is given at 5,000 square miles, and the portions that have been reclaimed have greater powers of production and endurance than the rich lands of Illinois. Among other things he said: "The swamp lands of North Carolina are nearly as great in area as the little kingdom of Saxony, which has nearly 5,000,000 people. The swamps of this State, if drained, could easily sustain a larger population than the entire State has at present."

"They would be capable of growing a vast variety of products. The rice produced in my district is superior to any other grown in the United States. Its superiority is so well known and so generally conceded that the planters in South Carolina and Georgia have for generations been buying it for seed."

"It is not generally known, but it is a fact that looked at in one way, North Carolina is the second cotton producing State in the Union. Of course the majority of the cotton-growing States produce more cotton than North Carolina, but this State produces more on each acre than any other, except Oklahoma, and the productiveness is rapidly increasing. Years ago North Carolina was far down the list, not only in number of bales grown, but also in product an acre; but she has been moving forward so rapidly that in the latter respect she is now next to the top. North Carolina is one of the three States that produce more than half a bale of cotton to the acre. These lands, besides producing an enormous yield of the common variety, would be suitable for the sea island cotton which is worth about twice as much as upland cotton a pound."

SPLENDID TRUCKING BELT.
"But the chief value of the drained lands in my State, and especially in my district, would be as the market garden for the large cities of the North Atlantic seaboard. The products, if moved by express, could leave the nearest market towns at sunset and be ready for the breakfast table in Washington or Baltimore the next morning, and could reach Philadelphia and New York by noon. The fringe of country down the Atlantic coast is peculiarly adapted to trucking, not only because of its fertility of soil, but also because of its climate, and its proximity to the great markets. In this part of the county isothermal lines do not run east and west, but northeast and southwest. Eastern North Carolina is warmer than northern Georgia or Alabama. It has about the same temperature
