Tobacco Trust is Illegal.

The decree of the United States Circuit Court in the government's suit against the American Tobacco Company and others, which was filed to-day, declares the American Tobacco Company, the American Snuff Company, the R. J. Reynolds Company, Pierre Lorillard and the Blackwells Durham Company a monopoly and engaged in an illegal combination. The decree restrains these holding companies from engaging in foreign and interstate commerce until competition between them is restored. The decree denies the receivership asked by the government.

An appeal which has been taken to the United States Supreme Court will act as a temporary stay to to-day's decree.

STATE NEWS.

Henry Conner, 12-year-old son of G. W. Conner, of Wilson, and grandson of Associate Justice H. G. Conner, accidentally shot and killed himself Monday while playing with a loaded pistol.

January 1st, the day that State prohibition goes into effect, the office of the United States revenue agent at Greensboro will be discontinued. North Carolina and Virginia will be divided into two divisions, with a portion of each State in each division, with headquarters at Richmond, under Revenue Agent W. H. Chapman, and at Asheville, under Revenue Agent R. B. Sams.

Nine members of the sophomore class at Wake Forest College withdrew from the college Tuesday when they were notified of the discovery of their connection with a recent mild hazing stunt. They were expelled by a committee of 9 students which has in charge the matter of eliminating hazing in the college as a result of a promise made by the student body to the board of trustees on condition that football be allowed.

In Buncombe Superior Court Tuesday Judge Ward set aside the fine of \$25 imposed on Dr. S. Westray Battle, of Asheville, by Police Justice Reynolds for refusing to be sworn and to testify. Judge Ward held that no person could be compelled to testify unless the court summoning him should have credible information that such person knew of some violation of the law. Dr. Battle was summoned to tell what, if anything, he knew about the illegal sale of whiskey in Asheville.

One day last week a white desperado, with a previous murder record, walked into a negro bar and billiard saloon in Memphis, Tenn., and with no provocation and without a word shot to death three negroes and wounded four, two or three mortally. When arrested the murderer simply stated that he just shot them and that was all there was to it.

On motion of S. Davies Warfield, R. Lancaster Williams and Edward C. Duncan, receivers of the Seaboard Air Line Railway, Judge Pritchard, of the United States Circuit Court Monday authorized an issue of \$4,250,000 in receivers' certificates, payable semi-annually at 5 per cent. The certificates are issued to pay the debts of the corporation under the receivership and to make improvements in its facilities.
