FARMERS' STATE CONVENTION.

Meets August 24-27—Suggestions to Those Attending the Convention—Railroad Rates.

Secretary T. B. Parker sends the following suggestions to those who expect to attend the Farmers' State Convention which will be held at the A. and M. College at Raleigh from Tuesday, 24th inst., to Friday, 27th.
A reception committee will meet all trains arriving at the union station Monday evening, Tuesday and Wednesday. When you get off the train, look for men wearing badges, "Reception Committee," or for sign, "Headquarters Reception Committee, State Farmers' Convention," and make yourself known. The committee will take care of you.
Those who prefer will be assisted in securing satisfactory accommodation in the city, while those who wish to room at the college will be escorted there and provided with rooms free and meals at cost.
Those who intend rooming at the college should notify Mr. E. B. Owen, West Raleigh, when they will arrive, but failure to do this need not prevent anyone from securing a room at the college on his arrival. Those expecting to room at the college should bring towels and pillows with them.
A rate of one and one-half fare plus fifty cents has been granted for the convention, provided there are as many as one hundred persons attending the meeting holding properly received certificates. The conditions are in the main that a first-class ticket at full fare be purchased from the starting point, or the nearest point thereto at which a through ticket to the place of meeting can be obtained, taking from the ticket agent a receipt for the same on the regular certificate used for this purpose by the railroads. This certificate, when properly signed by the secretary of the association and a representative of the railroads, will constitute an order on the local ticket agent for a return ticket at on half the regular rate to the holder. The East Carolina Teachers Training School and Its President.

The board of trustees of the East Carolina Teachers' Training School has issued a statement in regard to the able corps of teachers secured for the school, from which the following in regard to its president is taken:
"President Robt. H. Wright was reared in Sampson county, North Carolina. Graduated with honor from the University of North Carolina in 1897. After teaching in the public and private schools of his native state and South Carolina he did a year of post-graduate work at John Hopkins University, Baltimore. He was then elected Head of the Department of History, Civics and Economics in the Baltimore City College. This position he held until 1906 when he was elected principal of the Eastern High School, Baltimore. He filled this position with the greatest acceptability for three years, resigning to accept the presidency of the East Carolina Teachers' Training School. He has the highest recommendation from the most competent judges acquainted with his work for scholarship and teaching ability. The board confidently commends him to the fullest confidence of the people of North Carolina."
Bronze statues of George Washington and Robert E. Lee, Virginia's contribution to the nation's "Hall of Fame" were placed in statutory hall at the Capitol at Washington on the 10th. Formal ceremonies attending the unveiling will take place at some time yet to be determined.

While going down grade at the rate of 40 miles an hour, a vestibuled train, southbound, left the Southern Railway two miles west of Midway, Tenn., Thursday afternoon. The engine turned over and rolled 30 feet down a bank, followed by the mail and baggage and express cars. As if by a miracle nobody was killed, but ten people were injured.

A merger of the Riverside Cotton Mills and the Dan River Power and Manufacturing Company, two of the largest cotton mill corporations in the South, was effected at Danville, Va., Thursday. The name of the new company will be the Riverside and Dan River Cotton Mills, which will have a paid capital of \$4,500,000 six per cent. preferred stock, and \$2,500,000 eight per cent. common stock, in addition to \$1,000,000 surplus. The authorized capital stock is \$10,000,000.

Robbers blew open the store of Ernest Sikes in Campbellton, a suburb of Fayetteville, Wednesday night and obtained \$360 in money and several deeds and other papers. There were two of them and after dividing the money and throwing away the deeds and papers, which they did in a thicket about 600 yards from the store, they made their way up town. The Observer says this is the first safe-blowing Fayetteville has experienced since the wholesale blowing of safes in that city 12 years ago.
