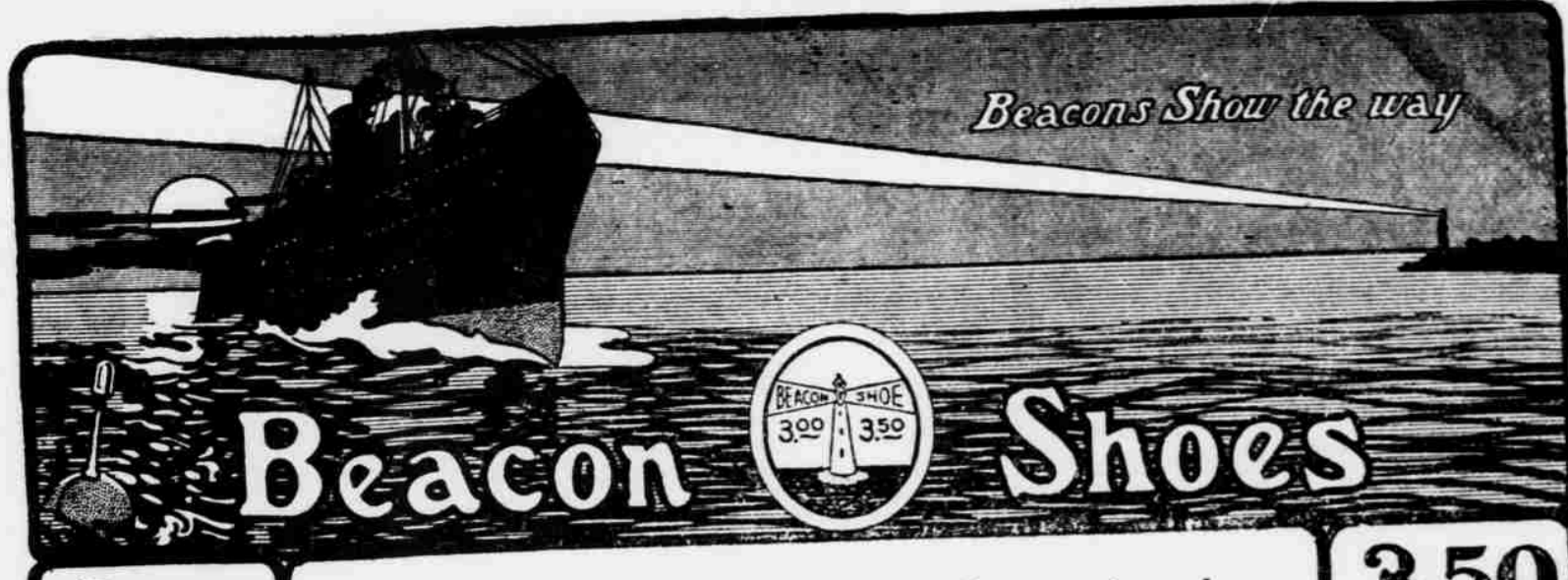

Sojourning in Latta, S. C. — Death of Esquire Lawrence Page and of Mrs. Sarah E. McQueen — North Carolinians Away From Home — A Delectable Chat With "Vide."

Correspondence of The Robesonian

Two weeks ago the 'Squire and I came down to visit our daughter, Mrs. J. L. McLaurin, who has been sick for some weeks and is improving, but very slowly. Her father returned home last week, and I will be here but a few days longer.

The crops in some portions of his section were greatly injured by unfavorable seasons, heavy June rains, and severe drought throughout the month of August; but the fine prices steadily existing will compensate for the shortage, and the farmers are in good spirits.

Esquire Lawrence Page, a prominent citizen of this community and oldest son of Capt. Wm. Page, died on Saturday, the 9th inst., and was buried on Sunday at the family cemetery, amid a very large assemblage of relatives and friends, the funeral service being conducted by Rev. W. B. Baker, of the M. E. church. Mr. Page had a protracted illness of six weeks' duration, and notwithstanding his splendid physique, and every care and attention from his devoted family, attending physician, and two trained nurses, after a brave fight for life he finally succumbed to that dread malady, typhoid fever. He leaves a devoted wife (who was Miss Ella Moore, of Robeson county), three sons and three daughters, an aged father, brothers and sisters, and hosts of friends to mourn his departure.

I attended service yesterday afternoon at Dunbarton Presbyterian church, beautifully situated on the banks of Buck Swamp, on a gentle elevation, surrounded by a fine oak grove; while near by, along the edge of the swamp, pretty wild flowers and vines of various kinds are rioting in rich profusion. The church is at present supplied by a young licentiate from Columbia Theological College, Rev. Mr. Pritchard, who gives promise of great future usefulness.

We dined near by the church, in the hospitable home of Mr. Roy Alford and his charming wife, Mr. Alford and his mother, who is an inmate of his home, formerly lived near Rowland, in our county. him to be an energetic and successful farmer.

A party of men passed down through this section of country last week prospecting for a railway route leading from Dillon to some point below here, probably the Fork.

We were grieved to learn of the recent death at Asheville of our only surviving aunt, Mrs. Sarah E. McQueen, widow of the late Gen. John McQueen, of old Queensdale, Robeson county, who after the death of her husband returned to her old home in Eutaw, Ala., and was a guest at the Battery Park Hotel, Asheville, when her death occurred suddenly of heart failure.

A recent letter from my sister, Mrs. Fickle, of Florida, gives me an interesting account of a former North Carolinian and kinsman, Mr. Hayes McCallum, a native of Bladen county, but a descendant of the McCallums of Alfordville. My sister had visited the lovely home of this gentleman and charming wife, near White Springs, Fla., her description of which attests the energy, taste, and success of another son of the old North State, so many of whom have gone to distant lands and through their enterprise, ability and high characters have become great factors in the upbuilding of other States. Mr. McCallum has accumulated wealth, owns a magnificent farm, well stocked with cattle, horses and hogs, of which latter he had 100 to kill this winter. His family consists of his wife and five bright children, and he is a man of prominence and great usefulness in church and State, being a ruling elder of the Presbyterian church. We are always glad to hear of the success of our North Carolinians, whithersoever they may emigrate.

Since beginning this letter I have had the pleasure of a delectable chat with one of your most interesting correspondents, "Vide," who is a walking encyclopedia for recollecting dates and historical events, and whose fund of information and fluent speech render him a most entertaining companion. He told me of a recent trip he had taken, a few miles distant from the town of Dillon, to an old ante-bellum farm-house occupied by two quaint old people who have never taken up with modern modes, but live in the primitive style of "Auld Lang Syne." As your correspondent drove up they were grinding grits in the old-fashioned hand-mill, a curiosity indeed, and doing their cooking in the huge fire-place of the ancient kitchen, a cook-stove and sewing machine being to them unknown accessories. Here he also

took note of a set of "warping bars", an implement indispensable in war-times, when looms were used in every homestead for the manufacture of cloth. His minute description of these things interested me intensely, and memory carried me back to the long ago, and made me wish for one more meal cooked in the pots and ovens from the great yawning depths of the old-time fire-place.
