Election Results—Godwin Has Good Lead—County Convention Saturday.

The Brunswick county Democratic brass convention was held yesterday and the vote entitled Congressman H. L. Godwin to nearly 12 of the 13 votes of that county in the congressional convention. It is stated that of Bladen's 24 votes Godwin cannot count safely on more than 2 or 3, instead of 8 or 9 with which he has been credited; that Clark will receive a majority in Columbus instead of 65 per cent for Godwin, as has been forecast; and that Godwin will not carry his county by anything like the majority of 23 out of 31, as has been reported. He will, however, go into the convention with a considerable lead and there will likely be a warm fight.

The managers of Judges W. R. Allen and J. S. Manning for the Supreme Court both still claim the victory, but Judge Allen's manager seems to have the best of the claim. He stoutly maintains that Judge Allen has a lead of 150 votes and will be nominated. The county convention will be held in Lumberton Saturday, beginning at 11 o'clock a. m., for the purpose of ratifying the votes cast in the primaries held last Saturday.

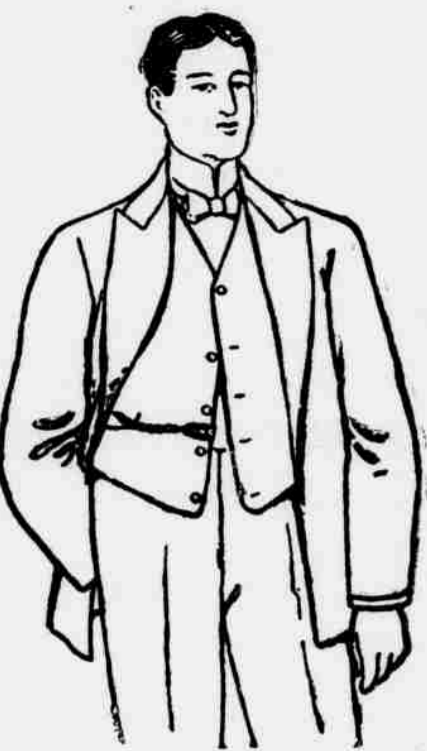

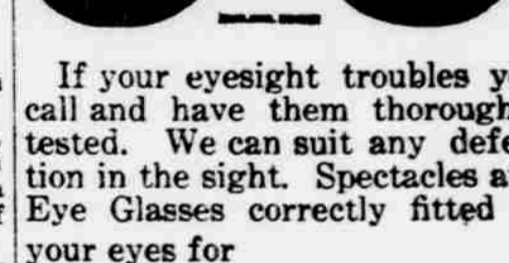
