

Death of Mrs. Lovedy Baxley—A Good Woman Passes.

St. Pauls, May 31.—On Sunday night, May 28th, God came in his goodness and mercy and took from this world of sorrow to her home of glory Mrs. Lovedy Baxley, wife of the late Mr. D. M. Baxley, who died Feb. 14, 1908. She was in the 86th year of her life and had been paralyzed for three years.

The deceased gave her heart to God in early life and joined the Methodist church, where she remained until 34 years of age, when she joined the Great Marsh Baptist church, where she remained a consistent member until her death. It can truly be said that "A good woman is gone." She was a good and devoted wife, always praying that God would spare her life to care for her husband until he died. She was a kind and tender mother, and it might well be said that she was a mother to the community in which she lived, always going to the needs of others. In all her long life she was never known to refuse to help any one in trouble.

She leaves to mourn her loss three sons and three daughters—Mr. N. Baxley of Wilmington, Mr. A. B. Baxley of Clarkton, Mr. H. L. Baxley of St. Paul, R. F. D., with whom she lived at the time of her death; Mrs. J. O. Lovett of Lumber Bridge, Mrs. D. J. Cashwell of Parkton, and Mrs. A. G. Edwards of St. Paul. The funeral services were conducted at Great Marsh cemetery at 4 o'clock Monday p. m. by her pastor, Rev. Mr. Weston, and the remains were tenderly laid to rest by the side of her late husband, who preceded her to the glory land a few months since at the ripe age of 80 years.

GENERAL NEWS ITEMS.

National Memorial Day addresses were made Tuesday by President Taft at Arlington cemetery in Washington and ex-President Roosevelt spoke at Grant's tomb in New York.

The recent decisions of the Supreme Court in the Standard Oil and American Tobacco Company cases will result in a sweeping attempt to secure criminal conviction of violators of the anti-trust law, according to Attorney General Wickersham.

Cleveland, Ohio, May 31.—Four are dead and a score injured was the toll of terrific wind and rain storm which swept over Cleveland and vicinity today, wrecking buildings, overturning boats in Lake Erie, breaking down wire poles, tearing up trees and smashing windows and signs on the streets. The storm was general in Northern Ohio and very destructive. Three lives were lost at Lorain.

Senator Lorimer, of Illinois, faces another investigation at the hands of his colleagues. The inquiry will be conducted by a sub-committee of the committee on privileges and elections, composed of four Republicans and four Democrats, four of whom voted for the conviction and four for the acquittal of the Senator last session. The method selected is regarded as the latest thing in jury trials.

Postmaster General Hitchcock Wednesday announced the designation of seventy-four more second-class postoffices scattered in 41 States as postal savings depositories, effective June 27. Those in the South follow: Florence, Ala.; Searey, Ark.; Fernandina, Fla.; Hawkinsville, Ga.; Bowling Green, Ala.; Bogalusa, La.; Brookhaven, Miss.; High Point, N. C.; Laurens, S. C.; Brownsville and Tullehoma, Texas; Nacogdoches, Texas; Fredricksburg, and Warrenton, Va.

Public hearings on the Canadian reciprocity bill practically were concluded by the Senate finance committee last Wednesday and Wednesday of this week was fixed as the time when a vote will be taken on the question of reporting the measure. No amendments to the bill other than that offered by Senator Root on the paper clause, which will have to be materially modified before it can be accepted, will have any chance for consideration, it was authoritatively stated by a member of the committee.

The crisis in the Senate fight on Canadian reciprocity is expected to be reached when the Democratic farmers' free list bill is offered as an amendment to the bill carrying the agreement into effect. That such an amendment will be offered for the purpose of embarrassing the Democratic supporters of reciprocity seems certain. It is toward this critical contingency that President Taft just now is devoting his attention. He is holding daily conferences at the White House in an effort to keep Republican and Democratic Senators alike in line for the pact.
