## CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR LECTURE.

Mr. Karl Lehmann, International Secretary of Christian Endeavor, Delivers a Lecture at Presbyterian Church—Reception by Local Society.

Mr. Karl Lehmann, international secretary of the Christian Endeavor Society, delivered an excellent address here Friday evening in the Presbyterian church on Christian Endeavor work and gave some interesting facts as to how the society is reaching out and making its efforts felt all over the world, through every Christian denomination. The weather was very inclement but a large crowd attended the lecture. Immediately after the address Mr. Lehmann was tendered a reception in the K. of P. hall in the Lumberton Cotton Mills office building by the local Christian Endeavor Society, which was recently organized by Rev. R. E. Steele, pastor of the Presbyterian church, who has the distinction of being State president of the society. The reception was from 9 until 10:30 o'clock and was a time of great joy for a large crowd, especially the young folks. At the opening of the reception, by request of Mr. John S. McNeill, president of the local Christian Endeavor Society, Mr. A. W. McLean made a few welcoming remarks, after which Mr. Lehmann expressed his hearty appreciation of the attention shown him and the interest manifested in the great work he represents. The total amount to be distributed in Robeson county is \$9,474, divided as follows: Veterans—3 totally blind, \$120 each, \$360; 2 of first class, \$72 each, \$144; 3 of second class, \$60 each, \$180; 5 of third class, \$48 each, \$240; 158 of fourth class, \$30 each, \$4,740; and 127 widows, \$30 each, \$3,810
