Provisions of Compulsory School Bill Which it is Believed Will be Passed by the Legislature-To Compel At-Populous Nor Wealthy as Robetendance of Children Between Ages of 8 and 14.

As mentioned in Monday's Robesonian, it is thought that the compulsory school bill introduced in the House Saturday by Representative Ray, of Macon, will be the one that the Legislature will pass, hence it becomes of special interest to every citizen of the State. This bill has been tested since 1903 in Macon county, which was the first in North Carolina tq adopt a compulsory school attendmore law. Quoting from the Raleigh News and Observer in regard to this

COMPULSORY EDUCATION BILL.

"The bill by Mr. Ray provides that any parent, guardian or other person having the control of any child or children between the ages of eight and fourteen years, shall be required to send the said child or children to public or private day or night school for children, beginning with the opening of the term annually, for a period equivalent to at least three-fourths of he public school term in the district, wherein said child or children may reside, subject to the following excep-

"Any case where the child has been taught at home in such branches as are taught in the public schools for the length of time required, or whose physical or mental condition renders his or her attendance impracticable, or who shall be excused by the school committee of the district in which the parent, guardian or other person having control of such child resides, said committee being authorized to experson having the control of the child, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, on account of pover-erty to clothe such child properly, or that he or she has already acquired the ordinary branches required by law, or that there is no white school in the case of white children, or no colored school in the case of colored children, within two miles by the Correspondence of The Robesonian. nearest traveled road.

It is made the duty of every public tchool teacher to keep a strict record. of all children in school and those of prescribed age on the census roll, but not in school, and to report the same to the county board of education on blanks furnished by the State board of education. The report shall contain also a statement as to whether dilatory guardians have been excused by the school committee, a statement of the actual time the absent child has not attended school. Such report by the teacher is to be transmitted by the board of education to the superior court at its next term for trial of criminal causes, and the report sholl be turned over to the solicitor. The teachers are to certify their reports on oath. The county board of education is empowered to appropriate out of the school fund of the county a limited amount of money, to plovide books for any child in a school district, whose parents or guardian is unable from poverty to provide books. Such appropriation is to be made upon recommendation to the committee in the district where The parent or guardian resides.

"Mr. Ray being asked what is the principle difference between his bill and that introduced by Representative D. P. Dellinger, said that his bill provides machinery for the enforcement of the law, while that of Mr. Dellinger does not provide sufficient machinery. The age limit in Mr. Dellinger's bill is seven to twelve years.

HEALTH AND HYGIENE.

Births and Deaths to be Registered-House and Senate Introduce Bills to This End-Some of the Provisions.

Bulletin State Board of Health. The Model Statistics Law has just been introduced in the Legislature. Representative Williams, of Eun-combe, introduced it in the House, and Senator Hobgood, of Guilford, introduced it in the Senate. Within recent years a number of States have adopted substantially the same law on vital statistics. Each year improvements are made in this law until very recently it has become known as the Model Law. The bills now before the Legislature represents the 1913 edition of this Model Law, so, if passed, North Carolina can boast of the best vital statistics law in the country.
