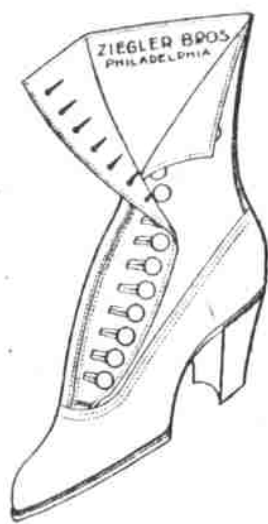

Spartanburg, (S. C.), Dispatch, 26th. Charged with shooting Ernest McAbee, his wife's cousin, at Moore, S. "SOME" SNAKE STORY.

But High Point is dry—moreover, the janitor has 12 of the snakes to offer as evidence.

In the eastern suburbs of High Point is the park school; in the yard are several thorn bushes; and when the janitor drew near unto these bushes this morning about 60 snakes (he says) were suspended thereupon. Pendant snakes being a rarity even in High Point, the janitor was more curious than fearful, so he made careful investigation.
