### Reports Containing Cotton Statistics to Be Posted at Postoffices.

The arrangements made by Hon. Wm. Harris, Director of the Census, for the wider distribution of statistics concerning the quantity of cotton ginned, the quantity of cotton consumed monthly, and the stock of cotton on hand at the end of each month, has met with general approval throughout the cotton growing States.

He has received numerous suggestions concerning a still wider distribution of these statistics, and he has made arrangements with the Postmaster General to allow the postmasters in every post office in counties where cotton is grown to post in conspicuous places copies of reports containing statistics of cotton. These copies will be printed on extra large cards, so the figures can be easily read. Mr. Harris hopes that in this manner he will be able to give the farmers, and all others, access to the valuable statistics collected by this bureau. Heretofore the reports have been given by the Bureau of the Census to newspaper representatives, and to the different telegraph companies for distribution. Following this distribution copies of the reports have been mailed to the farmers, manufacturers and business men, but there has been no practical method devised for the distribution of the information direct to the farmers so they can take advantage of the information collected by the Federal Government.

### WITHIN THE STATE.

Minor Matters of News Gathered From All Over North Carolina. The Observer says that Bishop Jno. C. Kilgo, former president of Trinity College and one of the best known Churchmen of the South, is seriously considering moving to Charlotte. His present residence is Durham.

Auditors who have been engaged for the past year in auditing the book of the town of Newbern reported Wednesday that from April 1911 to June 1913 there was a deficit of more than \$94,000 in the combined departments of the town. Uncollected accounts in the water and light department amounted \$24,208. The man in charge of that department during that period and the town aldermen are charged with laxity in looking after the town's affairs.

"Capt." C. W. Bower, who had been in jail in Greensboro for some time awaiting trial on the charge of using the mails to defraud a number of Statesville people out of about \$8,000, has been released by order of Judge Boyd on his own recognizance on account of his physical condition. He was taken to the home of his son-in-law in Statesville. He will be tried at the April term of the United States court.

### North Carolina Districts Affected by Action of Republican National Committee.

Washington Special, 17th, to Charlotte Observer.

The final action of the Republican National committee, providing the any congressional district that has as many as 7,500 Republican vote in 1908, or will cast that many in 1914 will give North Carolina 21 delegates in the next National Convention unless the first, second and sixth districts improve on their votes of 1908. That year Isaac M. Meekins received 5,342; McM. Fergusson, 3,361, and H. Slocumb, 6,385. The third, fourth, fifth, seventh, eighth, ninth and tenth will have two delegates each, and the first, second and sixth, one each. North Carolina had 24 delegates last year.
