BEGINS IN 30 DAYS Plans Accepted by Lumberton Hotel

Co. Directors - Call for 60 Rooms -Work Expected to Begin Within 30 Days.

Mr. J. F. Leitner, an architect of Wilmington, met with the directors of the Lumberton Hotel Company Thursday afternoon and presented the following plans, which were accepted, for the hotel which will be built on to prevent the deadlock between the Chestnut street, between Fourth and Fifth:

The building will be a three story structure with brick basement. In the basement there will be a barber shop, sample rooms, boiler room and storage rooms; on the first floor will be the hotel lobby and dining rooms, three store buildings fronting on Chestnut street and one fronting on Fifth street. The second and third floors will be composed of sleeping rooms, 60 in number.

Work will begin on the building just as soon as bids are received, and is expected that actual work will have begun on the hotel within 30 days.

"Dear Sir: "Your communication of June 16 ac. companying specimens of insects found on cotton plants has been received. Among the specimens we find representatives of the following species:

Monocrepidius vespertinus. Chauliognathus marginatus. Colocoris rapidus.

"None of these are of any special importance in connection with cotton culture. They occur in every cotton field in the South and are frequently so numerous that several individuals may be found in a single bloom. They feed upon the pollen and have no ef. fect upon the squares or bolls.
