SALE OF LAND FOR TOWN TAXES!

Under and by virtue of authority conferred upon me as tax collector for the town of Lumberton as set out in section 115, chapter 343, Private Laws of North Carolina, session of 1907, I will on Monday, September 7th, 1914, at 12 o'clock m., sell to the highest bidder for cash, to satisfy demand for taxes, the following lands and premises situated in the Town of Lumberton, Robeson county, North Carolina, more particularly described as follows:

FIRST TRACT: In the town of Lumberton on the west side of Lumber River, beginning at the north-west corner of the lot now owned and occupied by D. F. Turner and wife, a stake in the south line of Alfred Merrick's lot and in the east side of an ally, and runs thence southwestwardly with the east line of said ally 85 feet to a stake in said line; thence eastwardly at right angles 50 feet to a stake thence northwardly parallel with said ally 85 feet to a stake, in Alfred Merrick's and Joseph Merrick's (now J. R. Poole's) dividing line; then westwardly with said line 50 feet to the beginning and being the same land conveyed by J. R. Poole to Susan R. Turner, and registered in Book of Deeds 51, page 91, office of Register of Deeds of Robeson county.

Second Tract: In the Town of Lumberton, and in the section known as Lindell, a part of Lot No. 504 as designated in the last official map of the town of Lumberton made by J. E. Purcell, which map is recorded at page 16 book of official maps of Robeson County, being designated as subdivision "C" and "D" of said lot No. 504 located on a map of a portion of Lindell as subdivided by F. F. Wetmore and recorded at 5 J, page 180 book of deeds, office of Register of Deeds of Robeson county.

THIRD TRACT: In the town of Lumberton, lying on the Elizabeth road between Elm and Water streets. Beginning at the sweet gum on the north side of the alley and runs south 30 east 116 feet to the Elizabethtown road north 58 east 100 feet; thence north 25 west 96 feet; thence south 66 west 1219 1/4 square yards, containing the old McNeill stable lot, upon which her residence is now situated.

E. Purcell, being designated as subdivision "A" and "B" of said No. 529 located on a map of a portion of "Lindell" made by F. F. Wetmore and registered in book 5 J, at page 188.

SIXTH TRACT: In the town of Lumberton, on the east side of Lumber River, adjoining the lands of Moses Jenkins, Ella McLaurin, F. M. Barker. NINTH TRACT: In the Town of Lumberton, adjoining the lands of the parsonage on the south side of the Elizabethtown Road and others, and bounded as follows: Beginning at a stake on the Elizabethtown road, opposite the colored M. TENTH TRACT: In the Town of Lumberton, on the Elizabethtown road in the section known as Newton, being the part of land known as the Sellars lands adjoining the lands of Orren Ivey, E. D. McNeill, A. E. White and Frank Gough, W. I. Linkhaw and A. W. McLean and joining the colored cemetery, containing acres, more or less.
