

Prosperous Wilmington Business Man Charged With Embezzlement.

Wilmington Special, Sept. 29, to Greensboro News.

Charles E. Greenamyer, sales manager of the Fidelity Trust and Development company of this city, was arrested this afternoon by Sheriff Cowan upon receipt of a telegram from the district attorney of Pittsburg, Pa., stating that he was wanted there on a charge of larceny and embezzlement. He was required to give bond in the sum of \$10,000 for his appearance before Justice Harriss Monday.

The telegram from Pittsburg gave no particulars, but stated that necessary papers would follow on next mail. Greenamyer formerly resided in Pittsburg, where he was connected with several business enterprises, but has resided in Wilmington for the last three years. He says that he has been in Pittsburg repeatedly and that he is willing to go back on any charge that may be made.

The airing of this matter in the papers has come as a result of a hot fight that is being waged by the Tidewater Power company against the granting of a franchise to the Wilmington and Carolina Beach railway, in which Mr. Greenamyer is supposed to be interested. The voters in Wilmington will vote on the proposition on October 7.

Judge Whedbee Rules Inheritance Tax Can't Be Collected.

Judge H. W. Whedbee of the Superior Court announced at Raleigh Monday that he rules against the Corporation Commission in its test case argued before him last week involving the right of the State to collect inheritance taxes estimated to aggregate over \$100,000 on real estate inheritances under the revenue acts of 1905 to 1911. That have not been collected because the Attorney General ruled that the inheritance tax clause of the revenue acts of those years was defective as to machinery for collecting real estate of the late Mrs. Florence P. Tucker of Raleigh, claimed to be due about \$7,500 inheritance taxes according to the view of the Corporation Commission.

Judge Whedbee merely announced that he ruled with the defendant Tucker Estate in this case and directed counsel for the estate, Pace & Boushall, to prepare the order for the court to sign. The Corporation Commission will through their counsel, Kitchin & Manning, take an appeal to the Supreme Court.

WAR NOTES.

A narrative from Field Marshal Sir John French's headquarters, issued at London Tuesday by the official press bureau gives the reason for the long-draw-out battle, which has lasted 18 days.
