### LUMBERTON MAN WINS

U. S. Page Comes Out of a Mix-up Affair With Flying Colors.  
Kinston Special, 15th, to Wilmington Star.

A few days ago U. S. Page, a "mail order" policeman at LaGrange, who answered a newspaper advertisement to get his job shortly after quitting the United States fleet at Vera Cruz on July 30, arrested George Waters, the township constable of Moseley Hall, and locked him up for drunkenness. "Let me give bond," said Waters. "You are too drunk," Page told the constable; "wait a while." The climax was an aldermanic investigation of the Lagrange officer late yesterday. Page brought a clean discharge paper from the navy, and had no difficulty in getting his job. His home is at Lumberton.

Since he has been in LaGrange the ex-sailor, who is about 25 years of age and a modern Apollo when it comes to physique and face, has been paying court to the daughter of a prominent citizen, it is said. The prominent citizen possibly has not favored the attention of the policeman to his daughter; at any rate he is said to have demanded that Officer Page record as servant of peace and the people be investigated. Constable George Waters is believed to have harbored a spirit of revenge against Page. The young officer came here to employ a lawyer to defend him at the investigation, and soon after the pair arrived in LaGrange on their way to appear before the commissioner. Waters stopped them and read a warrant to Page charging him with shooting a negro. He demanded the policeman's badge and baton, and started him off to the town jail. "Allow me to give bail," said Page. "Nothing doing," said Waters. Page's attorney went before a magistrate and had the young man liberated.

The negro was brought into court as the prosecuting witness. He stated that he received a flesh wound in a melee attendant upon the raiding of a gambling house, recently by Page, and that Waters had visited him to accuse the policeman of doing him and persuaded him to accuse the policeman of doing the shooting, it is said. A number of other witnesses were examined, but no evidence was introduced to show

that Page was responsible for the slight injury to the black's leg. The magistrate taxed the negro with the cost and called the prosecution "malicious and frivolous." Page will sue Constable Waters for false imprisonment. The committee to investigate Page's conduct found it unimpeachable and then officially declared he was a model copper. The hero of Vera Cruz and modern Breaux Brunnell is today back on the job as guardian of Lagrange's peace.

This young man is a son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Page of Lumberton. He spent some time in Lumberton after leaving the fleet at Vera Cruz, last July.

### President Wilson Entitled to Supreme Credit for New Law.

Richmond, Va., Dispatch, 14th.

Representative Carter Glass, one of the authors of the nation's new banking system told 1,200 members of the of the American Bankers' association today that President Wilson deserved supreme credit for the new law, characterized it as a "legislative miracle" and asserted scarcely one power was conferred upon the Federal Reserve Board that has not been exercised by a government official for the last 50 years.

He said that the discretionary power vested in the Secretary of the Treasury by the new law to deposit and transfer government funds, which was criticized today in the address of President Reynolds of the bankers, had been possessed by the secretary for the last 50 years. He said he agreed, however, that some secretary might do wrong and that he believed the reserve law should have provided that the regional banks carry the deposits and act as fiscal agents of the government.

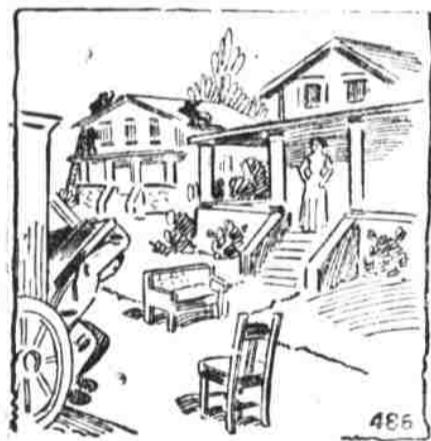
