MISS MILDRED McINTYRE'S RECITAL

An Artistic Program Presented at Meredith College by Daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. McIntyre of Lumberton.

Raleigh News and Observer, 9th. The auditorium of Meredith College was transformed into a beautiful rose garden last evening upon the occasion of Miss McIntyre's recital, marking her graduation in voice.

The program was carefully selected and contained numbers selected from the masterpieces of vocal writing. At the very outset the singer showed herself in absolute possession of her powers of interpretation and voice—and as the program progressed she added delightful color and nuance to her work.

Miss McIntyre's voice has something besides power and correct placement. It has that rare quality that so many singers before the public today would give much to possess—it has sympathy and very important qualities so often overlooked by teachers today, whose attention is too entirely taken up with producing vocal pyrotechnics and not enough with showing the pupil what the warm tints of the human voice can do.

Miss McIntyre's diction in French and German were most admirable and carried the dramatic and piquant meanings of her texts straight to her audience. Her rendition of the dramatic Aria, from the opera Samson and Delilah, was a surprise, for she carried a splendid picture of the operatic picture with it. This Aria is often attempted by young singers who find it beyond them. But Miss McIntyre handled it with surety and contrasting color.

In the group of English songs, she carried her audience with her to a keen enjoyment of the whole after a noon of much pleasure. In this group she was assisted by Miss Mary Pruette at the organ, whose accompaniment was sympathetic and gave a beautiful background to the song "O Dry Those Tears." Miss Pruette gave just enough color to the organ accompaniment to fill out the orchestral support this song is often heard with, and a creditable point in her playing of it that she had transposed it for the convenience of the violin and piano part, which showed excellent musicianship. The whole program was accompanied by Miss Helen Day, who is Miss McIntyre's teacher.

Miss Day's accompaniments are always a delight and the singers know this.

Roses and flowers of all kinds everywhere, the young ladies of Meredith College made a picture for the singer that was enough to inspire her to her best efforts, and she felt the applause and encouragement of the enthusiastic audience.

John Jacob Astor. America's first millionaire, was a very far sighted man. He left the little village of Waldorf on the Rhine to come to this country of wonderful opportunities to engage in the business of selling pianos, but he soon learned that there was more profit in the fur business. In good years and bad years, he prospered because under all circumstances he was a right economist and close trader. By the close of the eighteenth century, he was the richest man in the United States. Then, as his wealth continued to grow, he did something which nearly everybody thought was foolish. He bought land on Manhattan Island, far beyond the developed section, which to the ordinary vision was not likely to be encroached upon by the then little city for generations to come. The wisest men in New York said he was inviting ruin, tying up vast sums in unproductive land that meant nothing but taxes. But he kept on buying land. In 1848, he died leaving an estate worth over \$30,000,000.

THE NATATORIAL CLUB

Natorium Is Expected to be Ready for Use by Wednesday of This Week—Rules.

Reported for The Robesonian. A business meeting of the Natorium Club was held Thursday evening with Mrs. R. R. Carlyle.

The following rules have been in force since the club was organized last year.

Rules of the Natorium Club 1. Only members of the club are allowed the privileges of the natorium except sisters of the members and sisters must be chaperoned by their sisters who are members.

2. Age limit of membership fifteen years.

3. No less than three members are allowed to use the natorium at the same time. This is for protection.

4. Huse guests of members are allowed the privileges of the natorium.

5. Temporary citizens and members of non-tax paying families are not allowed membership.

6. No married ladies are allowed to join the Natorium Club.

7. There is an initiation fee of \$3.00, payable before entering the natorium.

8. No boys shall be permitted the use of the natorium under any consideration and their presence as spectators will be looked upon as an intrusion.

The natorium is expected to be open and ready for use by Wednesday, May 12th.
