John Roach was born in Ireland of poor

John Roach was born in Ireland of poor parents, and at the age of fifteen was sent to America, and landed in New York without money, friends or trade. He worked his way over into New Jarsey, and secured a job with the fiveli Iron Works. Ten yours went by and he had become an iron Worker.
