MARIETTA SCHOOL FINALS

Delightful and Instructive Exercises
Mark Close of Most Successful
Year in History of School—Rev.

Marietta, April 17.—The commencement exercises of the Marietta school began last Sunday morning when the school, in a body, marched from the school building to the handsome new Methodist church, where the commencement sermon was preached by Rev. Mr. Willis of Dillon. Mr. Willis gave us many excellent thoughts and his helpful and inspiring sermon made a lasting impression on all who were present. The music was an especial feature of the service.

On Tuesday evening beginning at 8 o'clock the annual concert was given. The program was a most delightful one. The children carried out their parts well and reflected much credit on themselves and their teachers. One of the most interesting numbers of the evening was a quartet, "Way Down Upon the Swanee Ribber," sung by Mesdames W. T. Jenrette and W. M. Oliver and Misses Lula Page and Rachel Oliver. The scene and the manner in which they sang were a delight.

Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock the school sang "Happy Welcome to All" in such an impressive way that every one felt glad to be in the spacious auditorium. Mr. Frank Gough of Lumberton introduced Mr. J. A. Brown of Chadbourn, the speaker of the day. Mr. Brown gave an address which his audience will not forget. He had many loyal friends in Marietta but when he closed his address he had won his way into the hearts of all who were so fortunate as to hear his enthusiastic talk.

At one o'clock the people were invited to dinner. A long table had been made in a nearby grove and a sumptuous dinner was spread. In the afternoon two medal contests were held. Miss Mabel Adams winning the girl's medal and Mr. Forest Hamilton the boy's. The judges were Mr. Koonce, a prominent attorney of Chadbourn, Mr. Harris, a leading educator of Raleigh, and Mrs. Renfrow of Nichols, who is one of Dillon county's enthusiastic workers. The boys and girls participating in these contests made excellent speeches. The medals were presented by Supt. J. R. Poole. Diplomas of honor for excellent recitations, good deportment and regular attendance were given by Mr. Koonce to the following pupils: Allene Page, Lacey Page, Willie Dell Parham, Elizabeth Wells, Mae Wells, Hazel Hayes and Henry Sanderson. Prizes were awarded to Lacey Page, Willie Dell Parham, Jessie Page, Hazel Hayes, Henry Sanderson and Douglas Bailey. These were presented by Mr. J. A. Brown. Mr. Brown then called Miss Rachel Oliver to the rostrum and presented her with a handsome gold pin, a gift of the primary pupils as a token of love and appreciation of her faithful work. A beautiful trio song by Mesdames W. T. Jenrette and W. M. Oliver and Miss Lula Page, accompanied by Miss Rachel Oliver at the piano, closed the commencement exercises.

The past year the Marietta school has reached the highwater mark of its history, having enrolled 107 pupils and having a higher average in daily attendance than ever before. Prof. W. T. Jenrette, the principal, Miss Lula Page, intermediate teacher, Mrs. Rachel Oliver, primary teacher, Mrs. W. M.
