Organization of the new farm loan board which is to administer the new rural credits system, was perfected here today by the induction into of-fice of its four appointive members the designation by President Wilson of an executive head and the selection of a secretary.

President Wilson named George W. Norris as farm loan commissioner, or executive head of the board. The oath of office was administered to Mr. Norris and C. E. Lobdell, Herbert Quick and W. S. A. Smith the other appointivce members, in the office of Secretary McAdoo, who is ex-officio member and chairman. Mr. McAdoo made a brief speech pointing out that the farm loan act was the first legislation to provide financial aid for farmers on long time and easy terms enacted since the foundation of the Government and declaring it meant more prosperity for the farmer and more in consequence for everybody else.

At a short session afterward W W. Flannagan of Montclair, N. J., was chosen secretary of the board. Mr. Flannagan has been secretary of the joint commission which investi-
