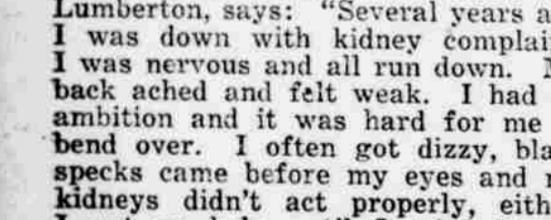

FAIRMONT TOBACCO MARKET OPENS TUESDAY, JULY 9TH

Outlook was never better for good prices. Buyers are already beginning to arrive and when the warehouse bell rings its loud peals Tuesday morning, calling together all our buyers to meet face to face around the golden weed of good old Robeson county, as well as other counties bordering on our market, the prices we will get for their tobacco will gladden the hearts of the many farmers who may be lucky enough to have tobacco on our sales that day.

Owing to so many of the companies' buyers being drafted in the service of our country and so many men having to be placed on the markets as buyers, we feel that the Fairmont market is indeed lucky in having all of its old buyers sent back to us again.

This is good news to the farmers, as they all realize the importance of this. Our market was never in a better position to serve the tobacco growers than at present. We have ample warehouse facilities to take care of and handle nicely the largest sales, plenty of labor to handle our tobacco, plenty of horseheads to pack it in, and we predict in advance for this to be the best year we have ever had for the Fairmont market both in point of good prices for the farmers who sell with us as well as quantity sold.

Our market sold last season over five million pounds. Help us to make it seven million this year. We need that much and have the money to pay for it, and the large companies are expecting this market to do it.

TOWN FATHERS MEET.

All Taxes Collected Must Be Reported Weekly—Ladies Invited to Use Rest Room in New Municipal Building—Other Matters.

At a meeting of the mayor and town commissioners Tuesday evening Chief of Police Alf. H. McLeod was re-elected to serve at the pleasure of the board at the same salary, \$100 the month, all costs to be turned into the town treasury. The salary of Night Policeman J. B. Boyle was increased from \$75 to \$85 the month. Mr.

D. R. Shaw was elected fire chief at a salary of \$15 the month, succeeding Mr. J. P. Townsend.

Clerk and Treasurer Townsend was instructed to turn over to the chief of police a list of all delinquent taxpayers and the chief must report to the mayor on Monday of each week the amounts collected.

Town Attorney W. Lennon was instructed to draw a suitable ordinance pertaining to the protection and care of the new municipal building and Mr. Ira B. Townsend, town clerk and treasurer, was named as custodian of the building.

Clerk and Treasurer Townsend was instructed to buy about 30 water meters to use where needed, also to purchase a body for an auto recently purchased for the fire department.

It was ordered that a circular letter be gotten out by the town calling attention to the rest room for ladies coming to town from the country provided on the second floor of the new municipal building. Local merchants will be asked to mail the letters to their customers.

It was ordered that notes in favor of the American La France Fire Engine Co. in the sum of \$3,000, now due, be renewed.
