MAMMOTH U. S. NAVAL GUN.

American Gun That Beats Freak German Long-Range Cannon Now in Use on West Front.

American 16-inch guns manned by American blue jackets co-operating with the French, began firing upon German railroad centers back of the Serre-Oise front last Wednesday. The Americans directed their shells against railroad supply stations and junctions in the region of Vervins and also in the vicinity of Rosoy.

These naval guns, which have been in operation since Sept. 14, originally were intended for new battle cruisers. They are said to throw a heavier projectile and have a greater muzzle velocity than any weapon ever placed on a mobile land mounting. The weight of the explosive used with each projectile is many times greater than that used in the freak German long-range gun, and in point of destructiveness they are incomparable. The organization for one gun requires an entire train; one car is a complete machine ship. The gun has shown accuracy before possible with guns of such great calibre.

Flood Cause Heavy Damage in South Carolina.

Heavy damage has been caused in the Greenville section of South Carolina by a flood which followed about 24 hours of the hardest rainfall in years Friday. Traffic on the Piedmont & Northern railway between Spartanburg and Greenwood was suspended and there was severe loss of equipment, large sections of track being washed away and trestles damaged. Manufacturing plants along Reedy river, which runs through Greenville, suffered great loss.
