AT THE PASTIME THEATRE.

After being closed for several weeks on account of the influenza, the Pastime theatre will be open next Friday the 15th. Mr. H. H. Anderson, proprietor of the Pastime of Lumberton, and Gem of Laurinburg, has secured the Hamlet Opera House, and from now on, with three houses will be in a better position than ever before to give service unsurpassed by any city theatre.

The occasional missouts which have occurred in the past usually happened on account of bad connection at Hamlet, but that trouble will now be eliminated as the pictures will start on the Anderson chain at the Hamlet end.

Another change which will be approved by the patrons of the shows will be standardizing the prices and cutting out the pennies. In future the regular prices will be 10 and 20 cents, which will include the war tax.

Only an special occasions will there be any deviation from these prices. It is impossible to give satisfactory service at a less price. Where the public has been paying the window tax the management has too many other taxes to pay to count them, but there is a special revenue tax, State, county and town tax, and in addition to all that, there is a reel tax which amounts to over \$25 per month.

In making the regular prices 10 and 20 cents the management assumes all the various taxes, promises the best service that money will buy and solicits the patronage of all lovers of good clean pictures. Remember, every time you pay your way into a theatre of any kind, you are contributing to the support of the boys over the sea who have whipped the Huns to a finish.

While the war is said to be over, our boys will still be in France for at least two years and we must give them the support which they so justly deserve.
