## ALL-NIGHT NEGOTIATIONS ONLY INCREASED RANCOR

**Bitter Controversy Over Treaty Plank—Efforts to Avert Clash on Floor of Convention Apparently Proved Futile.**

Chicago, June 10.—(United Press) Bitter controversy over treaty plank in Republican platform appears almost certain to be carried to the floor of the convention. All-night efforts to avert a final clash proved futile.

While the convention waited for the platform to be reported the resolutions committee met at an early hour to receive from the platform sub-committee a partial report which covered everything except the treaty and Mexican planks, at the same time the sub-committee giving first formal consideration to these questions.

Negotiations which went on until daybreak between those demanding plank for ratification of peace treaty and league covenant with reservations and those who threatened to bolt if ratification was mentioned seemed only to have increased the rancor which has grown out of this dispute.

## CONSIDERING PLATFORM DRAFT PREPARED BY SUB-COMMITTEE.

Coliseum, Chicago, June 10.—(United Press)—The Republican national convention met for 13 minutes then recessed till 4 p. m. to give committee time to go over platform draft prepared by sub-committee and agree on it.

Senator McCormick delivered message saying sub-committee had reached an agreement including league of nations plank.

Cardinal Gibbons made opening prayer.

Sub-committee plank condemns treaty in present form, commands Senators voting against it and calls on foreign nations to confirm American ideals and for principles of an international court.

## 50 PERSONS WOUNDED IN STREET FIGHTING

## DEMANDED ELECTION RETURNS

Box Containing Election Returns of Burnt Swamp Demanded by Out-siders But There Was Nothing Doing.

Mention was made in Sunday's Robesonian of some trouble at Buie on the night of the primary June 5. Calvin Lowrey, Indian, told The Robesonian the manner of it when he was in town Monday.

Calvin says that when the votes of Burnt Swamp township were being counted some men cursed the men who had charge of the election, but the managers kept on quietly counting the votes and said nothing, while Calvin and some others stood guard and kept any one from interfering. When the votes had been counted and the managers started out with the box Mr. John Gilchrist, a white man of Scotland county, overseer for Jno. F. McNair, another white man of Scotland county, an Bob Jones and Willie Locklear, Indians, who live near Buie, met them at the door and demanded the box containing the votes. This was refused. Calvin says when he told these men they would not get the box one of them said "They're not yours," and Calvin said he told them, "No, and they're not yours, either, and you'll not get them." And they didn't. The box containing the votes was taken to the depot for safe keeping and then Calvin and some others went back to "get" the men who had attempted to take the returns, but the men were not to be found.
